BRUCE'S COLUMN—DECEMBER, 2012: ECCLESIASTES 3



Dear friends in Christ,

Those of us who are baby boomers (and others as well) remember a top 40 song recorded by the group "The Byrds" back in the 1960's called "Turn, Turn, Turn". It was years, I mean years, before I learned that the text of this song was based on Ecclesiastes 3:1-8. Ecclesiastes is a short book found in the Wisdom Literature of the Hebrew Bible (what we refer to as the Old Testament). This short "book" is found between Proverbs and The Song of Solomon.

The passage and the song begin with these words, "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven". Many of you know the rest. The Preacher (the English translation of the Greek "Ecclesiastes") summarizes—well, life, really, in verse form.

I have served at Saint Mark's for my entire ordained ministry (so far). Many of you were present at Christ Church Cathedral in Cincinnati on June 24, 2000 when I was ordained deacon, and then again on January 6, 2001, when I was priested. On both occasions, members of the Saint Mark's Choir participated in the service.

Well, for everything there is a season, and that season is approaching for me...for all of us, I guess in some way. Back in the June EPISTLE I shared with you all that I would retire at the end of 2012.

December 31 will be my last official day as Associate Rector of Saint Mark's Episcopal Church; however, I will be on vacation between Christmas and New Year's. I will be in and out of the office moving furniture and other personal items back home. (Where to put it all! Oy!)

My last Sunday at Saint Mark's will be on January 6—the Feast of the Epiphany—and the twelfth anniversary of my ordination to the Sacred Order of Priests. And I am told there will be a big party that evening!

Now, there have been some questions over the last few months about what role, if any, I will continue to play at Saint Mark's.

The answer is this: I will be leaving Saint Mark's, and my pastoral relationship with you ends with my retirement. So, as your former Associate Rector, it will not be appropriate to speak with you or listen to conversations regarding church matters. This is as it should be.

Since Susan and I will be living the area, I am sure our paths will cross again in informal settings, where I will look forward to seeing you and hearing how you are.

Beginning in January, I will be worshipping at other churches in the area until I find a home parish, and I will continue my monthly visits to Trinity, McAruthur, OH, as their Priest-in-Charge.

I know that you and I share a love of Saint Mark's and want what is best for it—and that I can count on your support in maintaining these clear boundaries as each of us moves forward in responding to God's continuing call to us.

The last 12 years have been a real blessing for me, and I thank you all for the opportunity to share in ministry with you for so many years. I will keep you all in my prayers and I ask that you keep Susan and me in your prayers.

May the Peace of the LORD be with you all!

FROM THE MUSIC DEPARTMENT MATTHEW BESTER

December is a very busy month for the music program at Saint Mark's, as our parish family observes the season of Advent and celebrates the joyous coming of Christmas.

The month begins with a busy and exciting first Sunday of Advent on December 2. In the morning, the young choristers of our Canterbury Choir will provide the music for the 10 a.m. service, as they do every first Sunday of the month. For their anthems, the choir will sing a festive two-part arrangement of the well-known carol "People Look East" by the American composer and organist Craig Phillips and a challenging setting of the traditional text "Adam lay ybounden" by the Anglo-Welsh composer Philip Heseltine, a.k.a Peter Warlock.

That same morning, the Canterbury Choir will kick off its fall fundraiser. This year we are trying something a little different from our traditional fall sale of Buckeyes. Instead, we will be selling homemade soup mixes, packaged decoratively in glass canning jars. The mixes are perfect for a quick, tasty meal at home, and they also make great holiday gifts for friends, co-workers, and teachers. Proceeds from the sale will benefit the Canterbury Choir Fund, which helps to pay for group travel and other choir activities.

In the afternoon of December 2 at 4 p.m., the Saint Mark's Choir and the Canterbury Choir will join together for our annual Festival of Advent Lessons and Carols. This beloved parish tradition, which alternates Advent-themed lessons with inspiring anthems and favorite seasonal hymns, is modeled after the famous Festival of Nine Lessons and Carols at King's College, Cambridge. Music will include anthems by Thomas Foster, George Frideric Handel, Herbert Howells, Judy Hunnicutt, Boris Ord, Craig Phillips, Ralph Vaughan Williams, and Healey Willan. A lovely reception will follow.

Following our Festival of Lessons and Carols, both choirs will turn their attention to preparing for Christmas. As usual, the Canterbury Choir will lead the music for our beloved Christmas Pageant service at 5 p.m. on Christmas Eve. Our choristers already are very excited to begin working on such Christmas favorites as the "The Friendly Beasts" and "Joseph Dearest, Joseph Mine," and they are eager to discuss who will be singing the various solos.

Later that evening, the Saint Mark's Choir will lead the moving 11 p.m. service of Holy Eucharist, preceded at 10:30 by our annual Carol Sing for choir and congregation. Music for the service will include works by John Gardner, John Rutter, and Christopher Tye. Both Christmas Eve services conclude in the dramatic setting of candlelight, a visual reminder of the Light coming again into our broken world.

Of course, the Christmas season does not properly end until the Feast of the Epiphany on January 6. This year we are fortunate that this major feast day falls on a Sunday, and to celebrate the occasion both of our choirs will be present for the 10 a.m. service that morning, singing works by Malcolm Archer and Felix Mendelssohn. The day will be even more joyous as we celebrate the ministry of Bruce Smith on his final Sunday as Associate Rector at Saint Mark's.

Wishing you all a joyous Advent and a very Happy Christmas!



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WINDOWS INTO HEAVEN: AN INTRODUCTION TO ICONOGRAPHY

Join Paul St. Germain for a multi-media presentation on the history and spirituality of icons. This series will introduce *Saint Mark's "Icons for Meditation"* - an ongoing display of icons in the *Chapel of Reconciliation* in which great iconographic works of Christendom are presented seasonally for study and contemplation.

Session One: December 2, 2012 Writing Icons; "*Christ the Redeemer*" - *15th Century* 5:30 to 6:30 pm in the Canterbury Center. *Tea and sherry will be served.*

NOW IN THE CHAPEL: CHRIST THE REDEEMER—ANDRE RUBLEV (1360 - 1427)

Christ the Redeemer was discovered by accident in a dilapidated woodshed near Moscow Oblast, Russia in 1919. With several other icons stored nearby, it was attributed as the work of Andrei Rublev painted for one of Zvenigorod's cathedrals in the 1420s. It is currently exhibited in the Tretyakov Gallery in Moscow.

Andrei Rublev is considered to be the greatest painter of Russian Orthodox icons and frescoes of the medieval period. He was canonized a saint in 1988 by the Russian Orthodox Church, and is honored in the Episcopal Church each year on January 29. In Rublev's art two traditions are combined: the highest asceticism and the classic harmony of Byzantine mannerism. His work has come to be perceived as the "ideal" of Church painting and of Orthodox iconography. The characters of his paintings are always peaceful and calm, inviting the beholder into a place of divine serenity - often alluding to the mystical truths of human salvation. Gazing at Rublev's works has been likened to an invitation into the presence of the "holy" - or "numinous" - presence of God.



THE MAN. THE MAGIC. THE MYTH?: THE WORLD OF C.S. LEWIS

C.S. Lewis has been called the greatest Christian writer of the 20th Century. Of his over thirty books, including adult and children's literature, science fiction, Christian apologetics and scholarly works all remain in print to this day. Christians of all denominations have found in his work hope for the human condition and a reinforcement of faith in a personal God who created a fantastic universe - and filled it with hope, some would say "magic", and unconditional love. Holding the pen of these works is a very human figure whose life was filled with tragedy, joy and an unparalleled imagination. FINANCE REPORT

• **Overall results:** Year-to-date receipts of \$424,614 compared to disbursements of \$458,593 resulted in a year-to-date loss of (\$33,979).

• Revenues

- Although member contributions year to date, of \$374,013, were lower than the amount estimated of \$399,421, based on the balance of pledges outstanding, the revenue projection for the year is still on track with the estimate of \$483,560.
- All quarterly installments of income from the Endowment Fund have been received in the amount of \$10,379, which is slightly higher than budget.
- o Plate revenue is significantly higher than budget due to a large gift in January.
- Disbursements
 - o Staff expenses for the period include the pension payments for the clergy pension plan and the fee to the recruiting firm for hiring the new office manager.
 - Administration expense is over budget by \$4,000, primarily due to printed materials costs and copier maintenance expenses which are \$1,700 higher than budget year to date. The old copier had reached the end of its useful life. The new copier was installed in August and the new monthly cost is consistent with the annual budget.
 - o Facilities expense is under budget by about \$1,000, despite natural gas and water and sewer expenses higher than the amount budgeted to date.
 - o The formula for calculating Diocesan mission share changed on January I, 2012. Churches have the option of sending the mission share to the Diocese based on either an annual percentage or a fixed monthly amount. Saint Mark's is using the percentage approach: thus, the amount, at 14.22% of the normal operating income for the period, calculates to \$60,382. For the same period last year, the amount was \$81,561.
 - Vacation Bible School expenses that were over the amount budgeted of \$500 were reimbursed from the spring plant sale fund raiser and are included in the receipts as "reimbursements from other funds".
 - o Music expense includes the budget for the substitute organist. There is a question about whether we should expect a reimbursement of \$200 from the Diocese for the Regional Confirmation.
- Fund Raising
 - o A total of \$16,184 was donated by members of Saint Mark's toward the Fred's Fund matching gift offer.
- Annual Audit
 - o The annual audit was submitted to the Diocese on August 31, consistent with the filing requirement. Bob Gillette, the church's independent certified public accountant, identified no issues in performing the audit.
- Capital Campaign Construction Loan
 - The loan balance of \$52,500 was paid off on June 30, 2012, from unrestricted bequests, capital campaign cash and \$17,622 from the Trinity Guild. As outstanding capital campaign pledges are fulfilled, they will be deposited in the Trinity Guild.

YEAR END GIVING TO SAINT MARK'S

Donations to fulfill your 2012 pledge or to prepay your 2013 pledge can be made until December 31. A donation of stock can be made by contacting Dot Yeager, preferably prior to December 17, to allow adequate time to transfer. Saint Mark's maintains several brokerage accounts, including the Columbus Foundation, and regularly receives stock transfers for payment of pledges or other gifts. Please contact the Parish Office (486-9452) or Dot Yeager (626-1255) for more information.

Please remember Saint Mark's for any end-of-year giving that you may have in your plans. Unrestricted donations are always welcome, for they give Saint Mark's the greatest amount of flexibility to address its constantly changing needs. For those who may prefer a targeted approach, there are funds for reserve or long-term-planning purposes that you might consider, including:

The Trinity Guild Fund: Established to provide reserve funds for major capital maintenance and repairs. As of October 31, the fund stood at \$14,542.

Special Music Fund: Used at the discretion of the Director of Music to supplement the service with additional instruments, such as brass at Easter. This fund has also supported music events hosted by Saint Mark's. The fund balance at October 31 is approximately \$2,000.

The St. Mark's Endowment Fund: Established in 1978 to protect the long-term financial health of Saint Mark's and managed by separately elected Trustees. The fund's yearly investment income is transferred to Saint Mark's for use in the operating budget as needed. As of September 30, the Endowment stood at approximately \$364,000.

In *Grateful and Generous Hearts*, The Rev. Dr. John H. Westerhoff has this to say about planned giving, not just for today's needs but for future generations. "By giving toward the churches' endowments we can be in community with those who will come after us. We demonstrate our trust that God will be present and active in the church after we are gone, inspiring another generation to live faithfully."

The church also keeps an informal wish list for those interested in funding individual projects that are not currently in the budget. If you have any questions, please contact the Rector (486-9452).

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE UPDATE

The Stewardship Committee wishes to extend its appreciation to the many members of our parish family that have helped with the *Embracing God's Blessing* Stewardship Campaign this fall:

- We are grateful to all of our members who took time to complete the Stewardship Survey
- We appreciate the dedication and hard work that led to a successful Stewardship Potluck dinner on October 28. The turnout was fantastic!
- And we want to thank, Dwight Anstaett, Ellen Berndt, and Jodi Hess, who so eloquently shared their personal stewardship journeys with us.

An overview of the results of the Stewardship Survey was presented at a Potluck Dinner. There was a great deal of useful information contained in the survey. The Vestry is committed to using the results to help guide our direction for the future. Further discussions of the survey are planned in January for interested members of the parish and at our annual meeting in February.

One key finding from the survey is that "Funding for a full-time Assistant Rector" was clearly the leading financial goal for our members. Achieving that goal will require about a 10% increase in pledges, or about \$50,000 in additional pledged commitments. Our vestry has shown their enthusiastic support for achieving that target by collectively increasing their financial pledges (year over year) by nearly \$15,000.

Please prayerfully consider making a pledge this year to support the ministry of Saint Mark's. Pledged support is important as we prepare the 2013 budget prior to the end of this year and decide if we are able to fund an assistant rector or any of the other worthy aspirations of the parish that were highlighted by the survey. Stephen Ministers are there:

- ... after the funeral, when everyone has left and the emotions you've held at bay come crashing in on you.
- ... ufter the doctor says, "I'm sorry, but there's nothing more we can do."
- ... after the nursing home director shakes your hand and says, "Welcome to your new home."
- ... after the last child honks the horn, waves, and drives away—and the house suddenly seems empty.
- ... ofter the gavel goes down, the handcuffs go on, and your loved one is led away.
 - ... after the baby arrives, demanding more of you than you ever dreamed possible.
 - ... after you find a pink slip with your final paycheck.
 - ... after your family and friends have heard your story one too many times, but you still need to talk it out.

SAINT MARK'S EPISCOPAL CHURCH

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Part of the Diocese of Southern Ohio, Saint Mark's held its first worship service in 1951 in a converted Methodist church in Grandview. Ground was broken in 1953 for the Parish Hall (now the Education Building) where services were held until the current Nave and Sanctuary was completed in 1958. Office space in an adjacent building was purchased in 1989. Major renovations of the entire facility occurred in 2004 and 2008 SAINT MARK'S creating a campus today that empowers Christ's ministry within and beyond our parish.
