hris Thompson arrived at Saint Mark's a year ago with a smile on his face, and now he has departed, still wearing a smile.

He arrived to serve as interim rector after the retirement of The Rev. Paul St. Germain as rector and prior to the arrival of our new rector, The Rev. Vicki Zust, on Sept. I.

Not that it was an easy year for Chris and the congregation.

"Paul had been here 13 years and things were in good shape. The elephant in the room was the (COVID-19) pandemic," Chris said.

He recalled Rev. Jason Leo, the diocesan Canon for Transitions, telling him 'They won't forget you if you get them through the pandemic.'

Chris added: "When you think about it, we did. We had only two virus-related issues, both related to funerals. As far as I know, we had nobody in the hospital with the virus."

Plenty of help came from the Open Hearts, Open Doors task force organized last year by then-Senior Warden Dot Yeager. The installation of livestreaming audio/video technology to broadcast Saint Mark's services was a huge plus.

"It has been a gracious and joyous year for me."

Office Manager Melanie Jacobs and Music Director Matthew Bester "stepped up in incredible ways," Chris said. "I will be thankful and remember the incredible online Christmas pageant. What we thought was impossible became possible."

Chris and his wife, Mary Jo, now will settle back into their home in Winston-Salem, NC. Chris retired (kinda, sorta) in 2010. He has served previous postings as an interim rector; as of a few weeks ago, his future plans were undetermined. "I'm going to stay connected (serving as a priest); I'm going to do something," he said. "I'm doing what I've wanted to do (be a priest) since I was I2.

"And I'm also going to decompress. I'm going to put my grill together that's been sitting in a box since November of last year."


Chris and Mary Jo's eight grandchildren will figure into the picture, too. That's especially true for their three youngest grandchildren, who live in South Carolina, whom Chris hasn't seen since the start of the pandemic early last year.

Chris said he's optimistic about Saint Mark's, calling it a "very healthy, forward-thinking, hopeful church." He encouraged parishioners to set their goals high in their religious lives. "Christ will meet us at our expectations."

As for the past 12 months, Chris said, "It has been a gracious and joyous year for me."

He will serve following the departure of Rev. Chris Thompson, who served for the past year at transitional priest-in-charge at Saint Mark's while the parish searched for a new rector; the Rev. Vicki Zust accepted the parish call and will become rector Sept. I.

Bruce is a familiar face. Now a priest associate at St. James in Clintonville, he retired from Saint Mark's in 2012. He has served as a supply priest for Saint Mark's and other congregations.

Bruce came to the ministry later in life, after a career with New Jersey Bell and AT&T. In addition to a bachelor's degree in history from Ithaca College, Ithaca, NY,

he received a master of divinity degree from Drew University, Madison, NJ and a master of theological studies degree from Methodist Theological School in Delaware, OH. He was ordained in 2001 at Christ Church Cathedral, Cincinnati.

Bruce is a board member for the Procter Center and a board member for the Bexley-Seabury Seminary Federation in Chicago. He serves as a mentor for new clergy in the Diocese of Southern Ohio and as a chaplain to retired clergy and their spouses.

He and his wife, Susan, a retired Presbyterian minister, live in Clintonville.

From the Music Office

The call of The Rev. Vicki Zust as the next rector of Saint Mark's is exciting and welcome news for all of us! We owe the Rector Search Committee a great deal of thanks and congratulations for all the time and hard work that went into the search process. From the preparation of the parish profile to the discernment of candidates, they have done a great service for our parish.

As one search committee winds down, another may now begin its work. The search for the next organist at Saint Mark's is now underway, having been in a holding pattern for most of the past year as we waited for the rector search to reach its conclusion. We wanted the new rector to have the opportunity to be involved in the search and hiring of an important new staff member, and indeed, Vicki, the wardens, and I were able to meet about the search process within a week of her call as rector.

We have assembled a great group of parishioners for this search effort. The committee will be chaired by Ted Meyers and Matt Bester. Members of the committee include Steve Barker (representing the staff singers), Amy Brokken (representing the Canterbury Choir), Cheryl Boop (representing the Saint Mark's Choir as well as the Vestry), and Dianne Silliman (representing the congregation). Every member of the committee has a deep love for organ music and an appreciation for its role in our common worship.

The position was posted in early July, with notices sent to the American Guild of Organists and the Association of Anglican Musicians, two of the most important professional organizations for church musicians in the country. The committee will review applications beginning August 15. In the weeks that follow, we will interview a short list of promising candidates by Zoom, eventually settling on a group of two or three finalists. We will invite these finalists to visit Saint Mark's in person for final interviews and an audition, both as a soloist and an accompanist. Our hope is to have our new organist in place on or before Jan. 1, 2022.

Please keep the search committee in your prayers as we undertake this important process.

Canterbury Choir

Do you know a child who likes to sing? We are hopeful that public health conditions will allow a new season for the Canterbury Choir to begin as usual in September, and the choir is looking for new members! Open to boys and girls ages 7 to 14, the Canterbury Choir rehearses weekly on Wednesday afternoons and sings for the 10:30 a.m. service on the first Sunday of every month, from September to May. Participation in the choir offers an excellent opportunity for children to learn not only about the basics of singing and music theory but also about the Episcopal faith and its liturgy. The choir is open to all members of the community, regardless of religious affiliation, and there is no cost to participate. No musical background is required. In June, Star House celebrated Pride Month. Why is that so important? Well, did you know about the connection between LGBTQIA+ young people and youth homelessness? 4.2 Million youth (13-17) and young adults (18-25) in the U.S. are estimated to experience some form of homelessness every year, often due to family poverty and conflict. Recent research indicates that 40% of the U.S. homeless youth population identify as being LGBTQ and that LGBTQ youth are 120% more likely to experience homelessness than non-LGBTQ youth. Most LGBTQ youth experience homelessness from being forced out of their homes by their parents. LGBTQ youth experience high levels of adversity and need safe and affirming services. Star House offers LGBTQ young people safe respite and a chance to thrive.

BISHOP PRICE NAMED HONORARY CANON OF CHRIST CHURCH CATHEDRAL



In a surprise ceremony at Christ Church Cathedral on his last day of active ministry as Acting Bishop in Southern Ohio, the Rt. Rev. Kenneth L. Price, Jr. was named an Honorary Canon of the cathedral by Interim Dean the Rev. Canon Jason Leo.

Citing Bishop Price's long and caring ministry in the diocese and to the cathedral congregation, Canon Leo explained with his usual humor that he "wasn't really sure if we are allowed to do this," but along with Honorary Canon the Rev. George Hill and Sub Dean the Rev. Paul Williams, offered a resolution honoring Bishop Price and with the joyous agreement of the wardens and congregation installed him as the newest Honorary Canon.

PROVISIONAL BISHOP ELECTED

The Rt. Rev. George Wayne Smith was elected as Provisional Bishop of the Diocese of Southern Ohio during a special session of the 146th convention (virtual) on July 17, 2021. Smith was placed in nomination for Provisional Bishop by the Standing Committee on June 8, 2021, and the special session of the convention was called on June 10, 2021. He was elected on the first ballot of both the lay and clergy orders.

DIOCESAN COUNCIL MEETING AT SAINT MARK'S The Diocese of Southern Ohio Diocesan Council will meet at Saint Mark's on Saturday, August 28 from 9 am to 1 pm and all are welcome to attend.

The Diocesan Council is a decision-making body of the diocese presided over by the bishop and comprised of elected and appointed clergy and lay leaders. The Council meets six times a year and functions much like the "vestry" of the diocese, responsible for the development, implementation, and oversight of the diocesan program and budget.

SAFE CHURCH TRAINING

Decades ago, when Safe Church training first came to our churches, many congregations participated because insurance companies and lawyers recommended it. Today, in the shadow of the #MeToo movement and high profile congregational misconduct cases, we have begun to see Safe Church training as less about reducing liability, and more about Christian formation -- a part of our most basic Christian conviction to restore all people to unity with God and each other in Christ.

While the training is required for church leaders and others (such as Stephen ministers, lay eucharistic ministers, and formation leaders), the diocese recommends this training for everyone as we claim our biblical call and baptismal promises to love one another, persevere in resisting evil, and respect the dignity of every human being.

Two short films will be shown (descriptions below) and a discussion will follow.

WHY WHITE?

This film opens with a white-appearing patient struggling to declare "White" as his race on a medical form. He asks, "why do my doctors need to know my race?" and "why am I called "White" anyway?" which begins an exploration of how the labels "White" and "Black" came to be and opens the conversation of how White carries the weight of race.

I AM WHITE LIKE YOU, RIGHT MOM?

In this film, a white-appearing mother must explain to her black-appearing daughter that "you're not white exactly." The conversation expands and reveals the story of why, in the U.S., parent and child can be labeled as different races and how race invades the family space.
