HAVE YOU EVER WANTED TO LEAD THE PARADE, OR TO SPEAK SOFTLY AND CARRY A (SORT OF) BIG STICK?



S aint Mark's faces a dearth of vergers, and that's not a good thing.

Our parish currently has one active verger – Bill Silliman. Having additional vergers on the roster would be far preferable, according to Pastor Vicki. "I don't have a specific number in mind, but ideally I'd like to have at least five so that they only need to serve once a month or so," she said.

What does a verger do? A verger is most visible when leading processions for religious services and assisting the priest during the services. But there are behind-the-scenes roles. Vicki described the verger as "manager of the liturgy." Bill explained: "I often describe the role as 'master of ceremonies.' It is a relatively simple process of getting things set up and ready before the service, unlocking doors, turning on lights, lighting candles, replacing microphone batteries, assuring that the readings are set and marked, marking the Gospel reading, checking on the quantity of communion bread and wine, etc. I simply look around and take care of whatever needs to be done."

The verger provides any assistance needed during the service, stepping in to help keep the liturgy moving smoothly, and after the service completes a few routine tasks.

Bill has been a verger since 2009; he had enjoyed being an acolyte as a youth and was happy to become involved with the worship experience as a verger.

Vergers date back to the 12th century in English cathedrals. Vergers, spelled virger by the English, were termed the Protector of the Procession. As religious processions centuries ago proceeded outdoors through crowds of people and animals, the verger cleared a path with the virge, a wooden staff of office.

At Saint Mark's, vergers wear a black cassock and a black and gray gown.

"I absolutely love working with vergers," Vicki said. "Having a good verger allows not only the congregation, but the priest, to enter more fully into worship. One of the biggest challenges for me is to keep all the balls in the air on Sunday morning while not bringing my own anxiety into the worship. Having a verger makes that so much easier."

Both men and women may serve as vergers. Vicki said a prospective verger needs four major gifts: "A desire to create a space where others can worship; an attention to detail; an ability to see three steps ahead and a willingness to act" when help is needed. An interest in the liturgy and how it unfolds during the church year also is useful.

Bill takes delight in the role of the verger. "In my head I recite the beginning of Psalm 100 when standing in the back of the church waiting for the processional to start, Be joyful in the Lord, all you lands; serve the Lord with gladness and come before his presence with a song."

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ADVENT



Advent is the season of preparation for the coming of Christ. We prepare for the celebrations of Jesus' birth at Christmas, but more importantly, we prepare for His second coming. The season of Advent focuses on what each of us might do to be prepared for the coming of Christ. The season of Advent is the four Sundays before Christmas Eve. This year Advent began on Sunday, November 28.

ADVENT QUIET MORNING – SATURDAY, DECEMBER 4, 9 A.M. – NOON

A chance to take a moment, pause and reflect in the midst of a very busy season.

We will begin at 9 a.m. with Morning Prayer in the church.

There will be 3 reflections on Advent themes read during the morning. Each one will be followed by significant time for prayer and reflection.

There will be space available for quiet prayer. There will also be a space with music playing, art supplies and a space for conversation and reflection. Bring your art supplies, journal or other meditative aids if you'd like. The morning will end with Noonday prayer.

ADVENT MATERIALS

There are Advent materials available in the parish hall in the arch-shaped book rack near the kitchen, where the Forward Day by Day booklets are located. Materials include:

- A booklet of daily reflections for use at home.
- An Advent Calendar.
- A booklet of weekly Theological Reflections for Advent.
- Information on the Incarnation Seasons of Advent, Christmas and Epiphany and how we observe them at Saint Mark's.

CHRISTMAS SERVICES

Christmas Eve Services will be at 5 p.m. and 11 p.m.

The 5 pm service will feature the children's Christmas pageant. We are planning on having an in-person pageant this year.

The 11 p.m. service will be the traditional late Christmas Eve service.

Both services will be live streamed on the Saint Mark's website and Facebook pages.

The Christmas morning service will be at 10:30 a.m.

Masks will be required at all services and communion will continue to be offered in one kind.

FIRST SUNDAY PROJECT

Starting last month, Outreach began hosting First Sunday Projects. Each month, on the first Sunday of the month, when there is no formation activity at 9:30, the Outreach Ministry will offer a hands-on project highlighting an ongoing outreach project. The activity includes an educational component and coordinates with the liturgical theme for the month. These projects are intended as an opportunity for those who are not regularly part of the Outreach Ministry to learn about and participate in the parish's ongoing projects. Please feel free to pop in or out of these activities without any commitment. We hope you will consider joining us!

Thank you to everyone who came to the November First Sunday Project! We highlighted the Re-Entry Assistance Project. Guest speakers taught us about the needs of people leaving prison, the traumas that can lead them to make bad decisions the result in further imprisonment, and the difficulties they face while trying to reintegrate into society. We were reminded that there are no "bad" people, only people who make bad decisions.

Our December project will focus on welcoming immigrants into our community. We will have a short video about CRIS, Community Refugee and Immigration Services, and Joyce Acton will speak to us about Saint Mark's experience of helping to settle a family seeking asylum. She will help us understand the hurdles these families face, and the satisfaction the process can bring for everyone involved. Finally, we will put together some grooming bags for the Afghan refugees coming to Columbus. There will also be a children's activity that can be completed during the presentations. It should be a very interesting morning. You will find Joyce's talk fascinating. Please join us!


We are also wrapping small packets of diapers and wipes. Both of these items fly off the shelves at NNEMAP!




Helping a Fellow Episcopal Congregations in Need

Many of you know that we routinely work with Trinity Episcopal in McArthur, Ohio on the layette project, providing layettes to expectant mothers who are in need. Well, Trinity itself has a need, and both the Diocese and several other congregations have come together to help Trinity with badly needed repairs to their historic church (it is on the register of historic places). Prior to Saint Mark's learning of this project Christ Church Cathedral, the Church Foundation, St. Phillips Circleville, and St. John's Lancaster agreed to pool resources and contract for the \$12,000 of needed repairs such as tuck pointing, painting and mold remediation. Once learning of the projects, Saint Mark's wanted to know if we could pitch in as well, as the project didn't seem to be covering some floor joist work that we learned needed to be done during our last visit. So, with the help of \$2,000 from Saint Marks and some contractors from the St. Paul's Chillicothe Episcopal church, the project will be expanded to include these necessary repairs!

SAINT MARK'S EPISCOPAL CHURCH GRIEF SUPPORT GROUP – A SAFE PLACE FOR HEALING



"Blessed are those who mourn for they will be comforted." (Matthew 5:4)

"Grief never ends, but it changes. It's a passage, not a place to stay. Grief is not a sign of weakness, nor a lack of faith. It is the price of love. "(Unknown)

Loving another person is a wonderful emotion but when that person dies, we enter the universal and unavoidable world of grief. Experts in grief and bereavement tell us that grieving is an extended and challenging process. But we also know that grieving in an atmosphere of guidance and support can be helpful as you find your way to a future where the memory of your loved one brings more joy than pain.

Bereavement professionals describe grief as something that cannot be "fixed" but which must be experienced in order to heal. They commonly describe grief as a life changing process after which you live in a new way with ongoing connections to those who have died. These experts agree that, while there are many models for the grieving process, everyone journeying through grief must work through four major tasks which include:

- I) Accepting the reality of the loss: This is essential to starting on a path to healing. It's difficult and painful at times and frequently there are lots of different feelings and physical reactions to acute loss most of which are normal. In grief support, you'll learn about these, how to manage them and when to get medical help.
- 2) **Processing the pain of your grief:** Active grieving takes work and energy and can be a period of mixed emotions including sadness, anxiety, anger, guilt, depression and/or loneliness. In grief support you learn from other mourners about how to work through these difficult but important responses to your loved one's death
- 3) Adjusting to a world without the deceased: All the roles played by the person who died may come up as well as other adjustments in your self-definition, self- esteem, sense of control and understanding of life's purpose. In grief support we explore the meaning of roles left empty by your loved one and work together to find ways to create new meaning and purpose in life while honoring the love you have for the person who died.
- 4) Finding an enduring connection with the deceased while figuring out how to step into a future you didn't plan: In this phase we begin to develop a sense of connection with the person who died and remember them with more joy than pain and are even able to smile at the memories! The years with our loved one as well as their influences, inspirations, values and meanings of their lives are honored and celebrated in ways that work for us and our families. In grief support we learn how this phase helps us to adapt to other life losses and work together as each of us cycles back and forth through each of the four tasks.

Belonging to a community that understands and respects your individual grief is an important step in healing the pain of loss. Starting in December, Saint Mark's is offering a monthly grief support group for members of the congregation. Join us on Thursday, December 9th at 3:00 pm in the Bishop's library as we explore how to face the holidays and other special dates after a loved one dies. McConnaughey served as an Assistant Organist and Choirmaster for Evensong at All Saints Episcopal Church in Atlanta, Georgia for 15 years and was organist for Northside Drive Baptist Church retiring and moving to Columbus, Ohio with his wife Kathryn, to be near their daughter and son-in law.

McConnaughey is also a graduate of the University of North Carolina's School of Law and is licensed in Georgia and North Carolina, having been admitted to the bar in 1978. He practiced law until his retirement in 2018.

MASKS, CHALICE, 8 A.M. SERVICE AND INDOOR COFFEE HOUR

You have been asking how long we will be wearing masks in church. When will the chalice come back, how long will the 8 a.m. service and coffee hour be outside? And similar questions.

The answer is we don't know for sure.

Right now, Franklin County is at the high level of community spread of COVID. We will continue with our current practices until we reach the moderate level of community spread.

To reach the moderate level of community spread, Franklin County will need to have less than 50 cases per 100,000 people. At the end of November, Franklin County had over 150 cases per 100,000. Given that:

- Masks will continue to be required for the foreseeable future. Communion will be in one kind only for the foreseeable future.
- The 8 a.m. service will be outdoors when we can be.
 When it is too cold, or raining or snowing, we will move into the parish hall.
- Coffee hour will be outdoors when it is possible to have it. If it is raining or snowing or colder than 32 degrees, there will be no coffee hour.
- This isn't anyone's ideal situation, but it is the best decision we can make right now, in line with Diocesan guidelines.

THOUGHTS ON LONELINESS AND REENTRY AFTER THE PANDEMIC

As social beings, we all truly need each other. This is not to say we don't need alone time as well. But right now, we really need the interpersonal relationships, the friendships, and the contact with one another. The pandemic has affected all of us even if we are not aware of the changes.

Alone-ness is only one of the many situations to which Stephen Ministers respond. There is a list of life experiences which are addressed by the Stephen Ministry. Here are just a few possibilities:

- Isolation and Loneliness
- Anxiety over health issues
- Grief of all kinds
- Major life transitions such as a new baby, adoption, blended families, empty nest, retirement
- Tension from juggling work, childcare, and schooling
- Financial strain or job loss
- Uncertainty about the future
- Other unexpected life challenges

They may not all seem like major issues, but they can all disrupt our normal lives.

Every one of us will experience several of these life changes/challenges. The question should be "WHEN" you would like a Stephen Minister, not "IF" you would like one. You may only want to meet with your Stephen Minister for a short time. Having someone to talk with who is there just for you can be very comforting and encouraging.

EPIPHANY HOME BLESSING

There is an old practice of blessing homes at Epiphany and chalking the top of the door to remind us that everyone who comes in brings the light of Christ with them and that as we go out into the world we carry the light of Christ with us.

Chalk is used in this service as an ordinary substance made of common elements of the earth, put to holy use. Chalk will not permanently mar the dwelling. As its image fades from view over time, those who participated in its original placement will remember it and the purpose for which it was intended. In doing so, they may rededicate themselves to that purpose. After a year passes and a new Epiphany arrives, they will have the opportunity once again to celebrate the themes of this season and once again to seek God's blessing on their homes and on those who come and go through its doors.

Pastor Vicki is offering to come to your home and lead the short prayers of blessing and mark the lintel over the front door of your home with chalk on Epiphany – lanuary 6.

The writing over the door is traditionally the year and the initials C, M & B in memory of the traditional name of the three Magi who visited Jesus. As a reminder for us to seek the presence of Christ when we go out of the door. The mark looks like this 20+C+M+B+22.

If you would like to have your house blessed for Epiphany (with or without the chalking), please let Pastor Vicki know (*rector@saintmarkscolumbus.org*). She can probably fit in 6 or 7 visits on Thursday, January 6, so first come, first served.
