SOMETHING NEW - FIRST SUNDAY OUTREACH PROJECTS

We are trying something new at Saint Mark's.

The first Sunday of each month from 9:30 to 10:15 a.m. we will participate in an Outreach project in the parish hall. There will be something that people of all ages can help with and some information about the group or ministry.

We will try to connect the project each month to the liturgical season and themes that you will hear in the readings and sermon through the month.

Adults, youth and children are all invited to come and be a part of the gathering. We are looking for a name for this gathering. If you have any ideas, let Pastor Vicki know.

In November, as Advent approaches, the lectionary focuses more and more about the second coming of Christ and the kingdom of God that will be brought to perfection when Christ comes again.

One of the themes of this time is that when Christ comes again, He will bring freedom to prisoners and captives.

Our project for November 7 focuses on the release of prisoners and what we can to do help people being released from prison to re-enter society in a way that is supportive and reduces the chances of reoffending. We will learn about the Welcome Home reentry project.

The Welcome Home reentry project began with a suggestion by Marilyn Smith after hearing attorney David Singleton talk with the Sacred Conversations group about his work with Ohio Justice & Policy Center (OJPC). OJPC is a nonprofit law firm that aims to make Ohio's criminal legal system an instrument of genuine redemption for the thousands of people it touches every year.

The "Welcome Home" ministry will supply at least some basic necessities for individuals returning to the Columbus area immediately after release from prison. It began in August with a gift bag for one OJPC client. The vision is to provide a 2 -3 part package for new returning citizens: (1) a routine assortment of personal necessities such as toothpaste, shampoo, writing paper and pens; (2) a gift card to Target or Walmart for underwear, shoes etc.; and (3) clothing, a bus pass, and/or other supplies to meet individual needs when practical.

There will be a brief introduction to the issues facing returning citizens. We'll be joined by Johnny Turner, the Reentry Coordinator for Franklin County's Office of Justice Policy & Programs. Johnny has a wealth of knowledge to share about the challenges faced by returning citizens and the resources available for meeting those challenges. More than that, he can relate countless true stories from his own life and work about the experience of families living without an incarcerated parent, and the experience of returning citizens building new lives after release.

Those who attend will help package the supplies we have collected for each Welcome Home bag, and will leave with a strong sense of what this new ministry seeks to do and why.

All are welcome to come, listen, learn, help and have some conversation with one another.

Watch for a different project each month between now and May (although we will probably take a break on January 2).

ADVENT

The season of Advent marks the beginning of the Church Year. Advent is the season of preparation for the coming of Christ. We prepare for the celebrations of Jesus' birth at Christmas, but more importantly, we prepare for his second coming. The season of Advent focuses on what each of us might do to be prepared for the coming of Christ. The season of Advent is the four Sundays before Christmas Eve. This year Advent begins on Sunday, November 28.

There will be several activities and resources available to help us live into Advent this year:

Wreath Making

Sunday, November 21 after the 10:30 am service

We will have an Advent wreath-making activity on Sunday, November 21 following the 10:30 service. Everything you need to make an advent wreath for your home will be provided. There will also be a booklet with some history of the advent wreath and some prayers for you to use at home.

Advent Quiet Morning Saturday, December 4, 9 a.m. - Noon

A chance to take a moment, pause and reflect in the midst of a very busy season.

- We will begin at 9 a.m. with Morning Prayer in the church.
- There will be three reflections on Advent themes read during the morning. Each one will be followed by significant time for prayer and reflection.
- The church will be available for quiet prayer. In the parish hall there will be music playing, art supplies and a space for conversation and reflection.
- The morning will end with Noonday prayer.

Advent Materials - Parish Hall

There will be Advent materials available in the parish hall in the arch-shaped book rack near the kitchen, where the Forward Day by Day booklets are.

Materials will include:

- A booklet of daily reflections for use at home.
- An Advent Calendar.
- A booklet of weekly Theological Reflections for Advent.
- Information on the Incarnation Seasons of Advent, Christmas & Epiphany and how we observe them at Saint Mark's.

FROM THE MUSIC OFFICE

Matthew Bester, Director of Music

On October 24 we bade a fond farewell to Bob Wisniewski in his role as Interim Organist at Saint Mark's. Bob took up the post on January I of this year and initially agreed to serve through August. When the timeline for our own Organist search was pushed back by several months, he agreed to extend his stay through the end of October, at which point he would need to depart due to a previous commitment to serve in an interim role at another parish.

Saint Mark's has been richly blessed by Bob's ministry over the past ten months. Even before beginning his time as interim organist, he provided important recorded accompaniments for numerous virtual choir projects, including all the virtual choir music for our spectacular Christmas Eve service last year. His voluntaries, which included several of his own outstanding compositions, have been superb, helping both to prepare us for worship and to send us out into the world at the conclusion of our liturgies. His prowess as an accompanist has allowed the choir to continue to offer the finest in sacred choral music each week, and his sensitive hymn playing has supported congregational singing in beautiful and moving ways. Bob has been an exemplary colleague in every way. We will miss him.

Beginning November I, we will be pleased to welcome Jefferson McConnaughey as the new Interim Organist at Saint Mark's. Jeff will occupy this post through at least the end of December, as we wrap up our ongoing organist search process. Jeff was the Assistant Organist and Choirmaster for Evensong at All Saints Episcopal Church in Atlanta, a church with an outstanding musical reputation, for many years. He retired to Columbus in 2018, and we are very grateful that he has agreed to serve as our interim through the busy holiday months ahead. Jeff's first Sunday will be All Saints' Sunday on November 7, which will include Choral Evensong at 4 p.m. that afternoon.

In the meantime, our organist search process is nearing its conclusion. I am happy to report that we received applications from a number of very fine organists from across the country. After an initial round of Zoom interviews in the beginning of September, we selected four finalist candidates for in-person auditions and interviews, which will be concluded by mid-November. We hope to have good news to share very soon, and we are hopeful that the new organist will be able to begin at Saint Mark's shortly after the first of the year. I am deeply grateful to the members of the search committee (Steve Barker, Cheryl Boop, Amy Brokken, Ted Meyers, and Dianne Silliman) for all the time and effort that they have put into this important search process.

THE GIVING TREE

Children from infants to age 16 whose parents are registered at the NNEMAP Food Pantry located in the Linden area will again be the recipients of Christmas gifts from Saint Mark's parishioners as well as the other member churches of NNEEMAP.



The Giving Tree will be decorated on Saturday, November 27 with gift suggestions requested by the children printed on the back of the ornaments. Unwrapped gifts (with ornaments attached) can be placed under the tree beginning Sunday, December 5 through Sunday, December 19.

We always receive lots of gifts for babies and small children but have a shortage of gifts for middle and high school students, so please consider choosing items for teenagers.

Two gifts (one large and one stocking stuffer) will be selected by the parents in the Toy Room at the Linden Life Fellowship which is located just down the street from NNEMAP. The Toy Room will be open from Monday, December 20 to Thursday, December 23. Last year over 800 children received gifts.


There is also a weekly e-news called Sunday Reminders that comes out at about 7 a.m. on Sunday morning and has just what is happening at church that day.

our members of the Saint Mark's Vestry are stepping down at the end of the year, hopefully with good memories of their service.

Jay lams, Marilyn Karl, Rachel Dwyer-Markwardt are completing their three-year terms while Youth Warden Henry Markwardt is leaving as well.

This was Marilyn's second time on the Vestry.

"I wanted to serve on Vestry to be a liaison between Vestry and ministries with which I am involved. One of the greatest joys of being on Vestry is getting to know the other members – they are an inspiring group!"

Jay said learning more about the other Vestry members as well as the clergy who have served Saint Mark's in recent years was one of the enjoyable aspects of his service.

And that's a reason why it's important for other parish members to serve on Vestry, Jay said. "Same as my experience...know and enjoy more people at Saint Mark's."

Serving on the Vestry helped Rachel become more involved in the life of the parish. "I enjoyed getting to know the Saint Mark's community as well as the Vestry members better," she said. "I also appreciated learning more about the Episcopal Church traditions and structures and connecting to other parishes... Being on Vestry gave me a clearer window into ways to contribute" to the life of the parish.

"I'm especially grateful to have learned about the ways my fellow Vestry members as well as our parish leaders and staff serve God and community in so many myriad ways."

Henry became youth warden because "I thought it would be interesting to be part of the governing body of the church; I enjoyed seeing the workings behind the scenes of the church and being part of major decisions. It gives the youth a voice, which is important.

"I grew to know more people from the congregation and I ended up doing more church tasks, which expanded my relations with others. ... Seeing how much time and care is put into every decision to make Saint Mark's better was reassuring that the church is in good hands."

The Vestry annually seeks members of the parish to become part of it.

"All democratic structures need participation and support from members," Rachel said. "Members taking turns on Vestry also ensures that we together share the work and commitments of the parish across the whole community. I also think it's a great opportunity for members with disparate experiences and areas of commitment to learn about each other and each other's faith and priorities."

Plus, Marilyn said, "It strengthens you in your own spiritual life and commitment."
