A TIME OF CELEBRATION AND CHANGE

As I'm writing this the week of March 14, the weather is getting warmer each day and we have had two Sundays worshiping together with optional masks.

The pandemic isn't over, and we don't know what may come in the weeks and months to come, but right now we are taking a deep breath and beginning to do things a little more like they were before we all knew the words COVID and Corona Virus.

We are enjoying seeing each other smile and thinking about having parish events including food and beginning to think about what spring and summer events we might be able to do. Things we haven't been

able to do for two years. It is a time of celebration.

Except, there is an awareness nibbling at the back of our minds that things aren't really like they were before.

The most obvious, of course, is that there is a new priest and many new members have joined Saint Mark's. But there are people who have died and people who have moved or moved on in the last two years who aren't here.

Even when some of the same people are here, we aren't the same. We have been through two years of a global pandemic. Some of us have lost people we loved. Some of us have lost or changed jobs. The children are taller and older than we remember them.

come back, they will look different. New people may be running them. They may take a different form or be combined with something else. Some of them may not come back at all.

In addition to all of this there are joys. There are new faces and new things and ideas. The pandemic also brought unexpected blessings. We have a vibrant audio-visual ministry and a strong contingent of people who worship with us on livestream. That way to join in worship is available to all of us when travel or weather or health or circumstances keep us from worshipping in person.

We have learned how to conduct hybrid meetings, and we are working on getting better at doing them. This lets people stay connected and engaged.

All of this is to say that we are all experiencing some combination of celebration and excitement, but also anxiety and maybe even some level of grief at the loss of the way things used to be. Change is stressful, even when it is hoped for and wanted change. Please be gentle and gracious with yourself and with one another as we navigate resuming more inperson events and reforming what our lives in community looks like.

Pleasant Litchford Donation

With the unanimous approval of the vestry, Pastor Vicki will make a \$1,000 contribution from the Rector's Discretionary Fund on behalf of Saint Mark's to help fund the construction of a plaza to recognize former landowner Pleasant Litchford.

The donation will be formally accepted at the Upper Arlington School Board meeting at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, April 12, in the UA City Council Chambers. Mark your calendars and come if you can.


The story of Pleasant Litchford was first uncovered by Diane Runyon and Kim Shoemaker Starr in their 2019 book, *Secrets Under the Parking Lot.* Upper Arlington Historical Society Executive Director, Kristen Greenberg, discusses Pleasant Litchford with Upper Arlington City Manager Steve Schoeny and City Attorney Darren Shulman in the Feb. 25, 2022 podcast episode 4 of "Won't You Be Our Neighbor."

Litchford Plaza is a joint effort of the Upper Arlington School District and the city of UA and will be constructed just south of the new high school.


About Pleasant Litchford

Pleasant Litchford, a blacksmith by trade and a freed African-American slave, migrated from Virginia to this area of Ohio around 1830. He purchased 227 acres of land in southern Perry Township between 1833 - 1849, which he owned until his death in 1879. These two distinct tracts of land are seen on this 1856 Perry Township map.

His land stretched from today's Tremont Center to North Star Road, including what is now Saint Mark's, Tremont School, Northam Park, St. Agatha and UA High School. He donated a parcel of land to Perry Township specifically to build a school for children of color. Friends and family were buried in his private cemetery which existed on today's high school property. Litchford was also tied to other notable African Americans in Columbus such as Ezekiel Fields. Fields was the first pastor of Second Baptist Church, the area's first Black baptist church, and Pleasant was a founding member and deacon. (from www.uahistory.org/litchford)

Music in Holy Week

Hard as it is to believe, this year's Holy Week will be the first since 2019 with congregational singing and in-person choral music. Many will remember that in 2020, our Holy Week observances took place entirely over Zoom, just a few weeks after the emergence of the pandemic. Easter music consisted of pre-recorded organ music for hymns and voluntaries as well as chanted music performed live by a cantor. Last year we were elated to return to in-person worship for Holy Week, though singing remained limited, with congregational singing and choral music still not allowed. Thankfully, we were blessed with the participation of wonderful cantors to lead these services as well as some beautiful virtual choir anthems and hymns prepared by both choirs.

As we look forward to a return to a more normal Holy Week this year, I invite each of you to participate in the profound journey of this special week. Each service has its own unique character and lens through which to experience the retelling of Christ's Passion and Resurrection. Worship

Communion in Two Kinds to Begin April 3

We will resume communion in two kinds (i.e., bread and wine) on Sunday April 3.

At the same time, we will also resume coming to the communion rail for communion.

There are two options for receiving communion:

- 1. Bread only: You may choose to receive the bread only. Cross your arms over your chest when the chalice comes by.
- 2. Bread and wine: You may receive wine by sipping from the chalice. Guide the base of the chalice with your hand to help the chalice bearer.

The diocese strongly discourages receiving communion by intinction. (i.e., dipping the wafer into the chalice). While it seems counterintuitive, intinction is thought to spread more germs than sipping from the chalice because hands touch more surfaces and have more opportunities for contact with germs. As much as we try not to, it is very common for people to get their fingers in the wine when receiving by intinction, and it only takes a few people for there to be lots of germs in the wine.

April 3 Brown Bag Sermon

Pastor Vicki will give a Brown Bag Sermon at the 10:30 a.m. service on April 3.

A Brown Bag Sermon is when Pastor Vicki invites all the children to bring something to church and put it in her bag at the front of the church before the service begins. Pastor Vicki will find a way to use everything in the bag in her sermon.

There are a couple of rules:

- Nothing alive may be put in the bag (leave your pet rat at home – but a picture of her would be great!)
- 2. Nothing sloppy or messy may be put in the bag (if you bring slime make sure it's in a sealed jar).

Look around, think about what you'd like to bring and don't forget to bring your item.

HOLY WEEK AND FASTER

Holy Week

Holy Week begins with Palm Sunday, which this year is on April 10.

Palm Sunday - April 10

8 a.m. Service either outdoors or in the parish hall, weather depending. Rite I Eucharist with blessing of the palms.

10:30 a.m. Service begins in the parish hall. We then process with our palms into the church. Rite II Eucharist with music and blessing of the palms.

Maundy Thursday - April 14

7:30 p.m. This day commemorates the Last Supper and the giving of the great commandment mandautum in Latin, where the name of the day comes from. Eucharist ending with the stripping of the altar. The reserve sacrament will be in the chapel for private devotion following the service and on Friday.

Good Friday - April 15

Noon Stations of the Cross

7:30 p.m. Good Friday liturgy with communion from the reserve sacrament.

Great Vigil of Easter - April 16

7:30 p.m. The Great Vigil of Easter is the first celebration of Easter. We start in darkness and move through the story of the history of God and human beings to the joy of the resurrection. This is a service of candles and water, scripture and music.

Music by Saint Mark's Choir. Choral music by Johannes Brahms, Giovanni Pierluigi da Palestrina, and Charles Villiers Stanford.

Easter Day - April 17

Easter is the holiest day in the Christian year. The Easter Services are at different times then our usual services.

9 a.m. Holy Eucharist Rite II

Music by the Canterbury Choir. Choral music by James Higbe and Diane Lokensgard.

After the 9 a.m. service there will be an Easter Egg Hunt for children ages 2 to 12.

11 a.m. - Holy Eucharist Rite II

First Sundays Outreach Projects

The Outreach Ministry couldn't be more pleased by the great attendance at the First Sunday Projects. It's wonderful to have so many parishioners take an interest in the organizations the Outreach Ministry supports on behalf of the parish. It has been great to have so many hands to assist with a project to benefit the group of the month. We hope you will continue to join us, and that you will give us feedback about ways we could expand or improve this activity. If you have not joined us yet, please come in April.

What we did in March

In March Bill Karl talked to the group about one of our longtime projects, NNEMAP food pantry. Saint Mark's



along with a consortium churches and business partners is a participant the in NNEMAP Board. Saint Mark's also has numerous people who volunteer at the pantry support and the ongoing fundraising projects of NNEMAP.

NNEMAP is more than just a food pantry. It is also a place that connects users to other medical and nutritional services as well as hygiene products.

Customers of NNEMAP may visit once a week. Anyone in Franklin County is eligible if they meet the income requirements. During the pandemic NNEMAP prepared standard food boxes for pick up. Everyone got the same things and the same amount as shopping wasn't an option. As things begin to open again, customers will be able to shop in the pantry. This will once again allow for more variety, users will be able to tailor their shopping to their tastes, and they will be able to get amounts of products commensurate with their family size.

In 2021, NNEMAP served 19,249 families including 69,915 individuals. Providing 629,280 meal equivalents. This past year, 2,399 home deliveries were made.

During the project phase, we packed up 50 spaghetti meal bags as well as packets of pet food. Bill delivered the meal kits, and they were so well received that they were distributed to customers in just over one day.

What we will be doing in April

We will be learning about Star House a drop-in center for homeless youth. During the project phase of the morning, we will put together first aid kits that will fit into a backpack. The children will be putting together bags of Easter candy for Star House to hand out at the drop-in center.

We will also be doing a collection for Star House. Homeless youth are always in need of clean dry socks, so parishioners are encouraged to consider bringing a pair of brandnew socks with you on the first Sunday. We will



send the socks collected back to Star House, along with the first aid kits and candy bags, with our guest from Star House.

We hope you will join us at 9:30 a.m. in the parish hall on April 3.

The Layette Ministry is Changing a Bit

We had a surprise this past month when Trinity Episcopal informed us that they would no longer be able to partner with us on the Layette Ministry. Due to the size and age of their congregation, they didn't feel like they had the resources to continue the program. While we were very disappointed by this news, we decided to talk directly with the Vinton County Help Me Grow Program about continuing. They were thrilled to have us express a desire to continue the Layette Program as it is very popular with their mothers. In the future we will deliver the layette items to Help Me Grow who will pack the bags and distribute the items. They even expressed an interest in having Saint Mark's participate in some other projects, so the program may actually grow with this new partnership. We will keep you posted.

Artisans Beyond Borders Exhibit Visits Washington National Cathedral and Saint Mark's

Next month we will receive an artists' exhibit from the Friends of Artisans Beyond Borders in Tucson, AZ. This exhibit will display handstitched embroidery pieces (*mantas*) which depict the struggles and hopes of women held at the Mexico border-side of Nogales (Arizona) while they wait for permission to seek asylum in the United States.

These South and Central America women and their children have traveled as far as 2,500 miles away fleeing violence or other unbearable circumstances to protect their families. They often live in dire situations at the border enduring the harsh weather of the Sonoran Desert – extreme heat and cold, while they wait for legal permission to enter the United States. While there, they learn the skills of creating these handstitched works which portray deep spiritual expressions of faith, loss and hope.

Starting early in May, this exhibit will be in our sanctuary along the back walls for our parish to view. On Saturday, May 21 from noon to 4 p.m., we will present this exhibit to the public. Along with the exhibit, we are planning an outside "fiesta" complete with Latin music, food trucks, and games.

Joining us for this public exhibition will be Valarie James, who is the creator/founder of both the Artisans Beyond Borders non-profit organization and this traveling exhibit. Valarie is a longtime resident of the U.S.-Mexico borderlands and a member of Grace St. Paul's Episcopal Church in Tucson. A former Clinical Art Therapist, she was the coordinator of the all-volunteer trauma-informed Arts & Activities Program at Tucson's Casa Alitas Migrant shelter, and co-curator of "Hope & Healing: The Art of Asylum" exhibition of artwork by Casa Alitas refugee youth.

This exhibit will travel across the United States. Prior to coming to Saint Mark's, it will be at the University of Southern California. It will also be featured at the Washington National Cathedral. We are honored to be a recipient of such an important exposition.

A New Life -- Are You Kidding?

An important step in the grief process is mourning the life you thought you were going to have with the person who died. Early after loss, the idea of creating a new and fulfilling life without your loved one can be distressing and overwhelming. The distress may come from your belief that finding happiness would be disloyal to the person who died. You're also likely putting a lot of energy into surviving each day and adapting to multiple changes in your roles and responsibilities - and this can make you feel overwhelmed and exhausted. All these and other emotions may make the thought of creating a hopeful future seem like a very bad joke.

Yet, an important task in grief is to find meaning for your life after a death. The Easter message of resurrection, renewal, and hope helps us to think about how we will live out our futures and maybe – over time – accept the future as a new beginning. Come to Saint Mark's Grief Support Group and spend some time with others who are working through loss. We meet next at 3 p.m. on Thursday, April 14, in the Canterbury Center. No matter where you are in your grief journey, you're welcome to join us – you'll be in good company!
