Remember that the coming of Immanuel, God with us, means that you actually are in the presence of God right now.



The Giving Tree - December 4 thru 18

The collection has begun for the NNEMAP Christmas Store.

Children from infants to age 16 whose parents are registered at the NNEMAP Food Pantry will again be the recipients of Christmas gifts from Saint Mark's parishioners as well as the other member churches of NNEMAP.

The Giving Tree is decorated with ornaments with gift suggestions printed on the back. Unwrapped gifts (with ornaments attached please) can be placed under the tree through Sunday, December 18.

Parents will be able to select two gifts (one large and one stocking stuffer) from the Toy Room located at Linden Life Fellowship, which is just down the street from NNEMAP. The Toy Room will be open beginning Monday, December 20 and will run until Thursday, December 23. Last year over 800 children received gifts from the Toy Room store.

Cookie Walk - December 18

The Annual Cookie Walk will be held on Sunday December 18. As the congregants of the 8 a.m. service were very supportive of the fall festival, we will set up a smaller scale version of cookie walk after the 8 a.m. service.

For those who might not have been to the Cookie Walk before, this is one of the Outreach Ministry's pri-

mary fundraisers. We ask congregants to bake some of their favorite cookies to donate to the Cookie Walk. The cookies should be brought to the kitchen the morning of the Cookie Walk or the day before. Outreach members will display the cookies on platters which are set up on tables in the parish hall. Congregants can walk through the line selecting a wide variety of cookies to purchase. The cookies are sold by weight.

Jesse Tree-A Story-A-Day Advent "Calendar"

A Jesse Tree is a way of preparing for Advent by journeying through the stories on Jesus's family tree.

The Jesse Tree tradition is rooted in Isaiah 11:1: "A shoot shall come out from the stump of Jesse, and a branch shall grow out of his roots." Jesse was the father of David, Israel's greatest king. And Jesus is descended from the line of David. He is the branch God promised would grow from Jesse's family tree.


Each ornament on the tree has a symbol that represents a bible story beginning with Genesis. Each day a story is read and corresponding symbol place on the tree. As the tree accumulates ornaments, you see how God prepared for Jesus to be born through many generations.

Check out the Children's Formation Jesse Tree located in the Parish Hall and consider adopting a similar tradition at home. There are lots of ways to create a Jesse Tree of your own that can be quite simple with free or inexpensive online downloads.

Adult Formation

Adult Formation meets from 9:30 to 10:15 a.m. on Sunday mornings in the parish hall, except for the first Sundays of the month when we gather for the First Sunday Intergenerational Project.

On December 11 and 18 Pastor Vicki will explore the development of the liturgical calendar: How we got the cycle of seasons and feasts that the church observes.

There will be no Adult formation on December 25 or January I.

Youth Group

Youth Group, for middle- and high school—age kids, gathers for lunch and an activity on the First Sundays of the month following the 10:30 a.m. service. Youth Group programming typically ends at 1:30 p.m.

On Sunday December 4, youth group will meet following the 10:30 service for lunch and games.

All Canterbury Choir members are all invited to join the youth group for lunch and games and to stay for a movie and snack until your call time for Lessons and Carols.

Brown Bag Sermon - December 4

At the 10:30 am service, Pastor Vicki will give a Brown Bag sermon.

The way this works is that all children and youth are invited to bring something to put in a brown bag at the front of the church.

The challenge for Pastor Vicki will be to construct her sermon improv-style by including every item in the bag. There are a few rules:

- Nothing alive.
- Nothing sticky, sloppy, gooey, or messy (put your slime in a jar before putting it in the bag)
- Nothing that will injure Pastor Vicki as she picks it up (so nothing sharp or pointy)

Look around, be creative and bring something for the bag. The items put in the bag will be returned after the sermon.

VESTRY

Give to Saint Mark's: Consider Serving on Vestry



The vestry is the governing body of the parish and consists of 15 members of the parish who are elected by the congregation. It is the vestry's responsibility to be the final decision-making body that hires the rector, approves the parish budget, makes parish policy decisions, and spends the parish's money on mission, ministry, and maintenance

The vestry consists of a senior warden, a junior warden, and a youth warden (high school age), each of whom are elected by the parish for a 1-year term. The other 12 members of the vestry are elected for 3-year terms, normally with four members elected each year. At its first meeting in each calendar year, the vestry appoints a treasurer and a clerk. The treasurer and clerk are not voting members of the vestry by virtue of being appointed to office.

While not specified in the bylaws, historically the expectation was that when a parishioner was elected to the vestry, they also took responsibility for a specific committee, such as Outreach, Formation, Stewardship, or Hospitality. However, we are moving away from that model and instead, the vestry divides ongoing committee work, ad hoc projects, and one-time events, with each vestry member taking on those things that are interesting to them and that fit into their schedules.

The wardens each have particular areas of focus in addition to the regular vestry responsibilities.

The senior warden works with the rector and vestry members to oversee the smooth administration of Saint Mark's. The junior warden works with the rector and vestry members to oversee the physical facilities.

The youth warden works with the rector to bring the viewpoint of the youth the leadership of Saint Mark's. Two youth can be elected to share the position.

The senior and junior wardens each serve as delegates to the Diocesan Convention. Two additional delegates and four alternate delegates will be elected at the Saint Mark's Annual Meeting in February. These elected and ex-officio delegates will vote in the 2023 election for the next Bishop of Southern Ohio.

After many years of dedicated service as vestry clerk, Barb Hyre is stepping down to explore other areas of ministry. We are looking for someone to consider filling that role, which involves attending vestry meetings and taking minutes.

In the coming weeks, the nominating committee will reach out to ask people to consider serving on vestry. Please pray about whether you would like to volunteer to run for a vestry or warden position, serve as a Convention Delegate, or as clerk. Consider attending an upcoming vestry meeting – especially if you have never been to one before. Vestry meetings are open to parishioners and are held at 7:30 p.m. on the First Tuesday of the month in the Canterbury Center.

Mark Drew, Senior Warden



Q: What did you enjoy about your service?

Two things: First, I've developed some deep and lasting friendships with quite a few members, especially those who have served alongside me on Vestry in addition to many others I've worked with. Being

part of lay leadership puts you in a position to form strong relationships with others who care deeply about the health of the ministry of Saint Mark's.

Second, serving as both junior and senior warden has helped me grow spiritually in a way I had not expected. Through the almost-daily perspective of seeing our parish as a whole ministry "machine" (staff, lay-leadership, members), I gained a newfound faith in the purpose and importance of the message that Saint Mark's brings to all. We of course do obvious good work in the form of formal Sunday worship, but our care and respect for those who may never cross our doors has helped me in faith to a degree I had not imagined.

A: Make sure to be assertive in Vestry meetings. I know it can be nervewracking at first, sitting among the people who are behind everything the church stands for and does, but make sure to speak up and make yourself heard! Your views are

valued just as much as you value theirs, and I know you'll do a great job.

Q: As junior warden you play a big role in overseeing the physical plant of Saint Mark's. What do you take away from that experience?

A: I learned a lot about the operation and maintenance of the campus, as well as where we were falling short. We had a lot of deferred maintenance when I started. I don't think

the amount of deferred maintenance is appreciated by most of the parish. For example, our bell tower has had no maintenance since it was built, and several of our AC units are well beyond their life expectancy. I also became intimately familiar with the parish budget and in particular the facilities budget. I am proud I was able to start a Facilities Committee of the Vestry to expand the number of people focusing on the facilities. I am also very proud that we will have a part-time facilities manager on board before I leave. The position of Junior Warden gives you an opportunity to serve in the leadership of the parish, which can be rewarding. You have the opportunity to bring about change, and to make Saint Mark's a better place.

Q: What are some of the highlights of your term?


A: As a member of the Vestry, you can see, and support, all the good being done by parishioners, both within the parish and in the greater community. For example, the strong response by the parish to the challenges of the

COVID-19 pandemic led to creation of a sophisticated audio-visual online broadcast system that will serve Saint Mark's for years to come. The Vestry has embraced Pastor Vicki's efforts to develop new programs for the parish and to increase Saint Mark's visibility in the community. Saint Mark's is an oasis of welcoming Christian love; you can see this in all the many volunteers who make the parish go and the increasing numbers of community members drawn to Saint Mark's in person and online.



A Word From the Treasurer—Good News is Always Worth Sharing!

As we near the end of the year, I am happy to share good news on the financial front. You may remember that we



passed a budget for 2022 that projected a deficit of slightly more than \$75,000. We had the financial strength to sustain at least two years of deficits at that level and strongly felt that it was time to invest in our programs and ministries with an energized new Rector and people returning to worship in person at church.

With a \$33,000 gift from a generous member, I can conservatively project that we will exceed our budgeted revenue (excluding unrealized market losses in our Endowment Fund) and expect to be well under our budgeted expenses, resulting in a deficit significantly lower than expected. We still have strong financial reserves, and our membership is growing! After two years of declining pledges, our pledging increased by 4% last year, and this year should grow by an additional 7%, or \$30,000, in an uncertain economy.

The enthusiasm and excitement around Saint Mark's is palpable, and that can mean nothing but continued growth in members and financial support for our parish.

We have much to be grateful for during this Christmas season!

chatting while we work. It is a great opportunity to visit with your friends or to get to know some new friends. It only takes about an hour. The diapers and spices that we pack are popular items at NNEMAP and fly off the shelves.

Move to Prosper

Several months ago, we told you that the Outreach Ministry had decided to support Move to Prosper, a new non-profit that is attempting to provide opportunities for children and financial stability for low-income families by moving them to neighborhoods where they have increased resources. They also provide them mentorship and coaching to help them succeed. Recently we received Move to Prosper's 2022 Impact Statement highlighting the group's pilot program. The average amount added to each household's annual income was \$17,000. Average incomes rose from \$29,000 to \$46,000. One hundred percent of the women graduating from the 3-year program feel ready to take on the full cost of their rent without the subsidy provided through the program. The success of the pilot program gave Move to Prosper the confidence to take on 16 new families. Their hope is that they will be able to welcome 100 new families into the program by 2025.

PASTORAL CARE

Stephen Ministries—Christ Caring. For People. Through People

The Stephen Ministry Program at Saint Mark's was initiated in 2009 by then Rector The Rev. Dr. Paul St. Germain after success he had with the program at his previous parish. Paul asked The Rev. Joan Maynard, then Saint

Mark's Pastoral Deacon, to start a program at Saint Mark's. Joan was joined by Pat Barton and together they attended an immersive Stephen Ministries training course in Pittsburgh. Shortly after, in 2010, Joan and Pat trained the first group of four Stephen Ministers. Since then the program has steadily grown. Twenty-eight parishioners have comtraining pleted and nearly 50 parishioners have received care by a Stephen Minister.



Stephen Ministers are The After People. They are ready to come alongside you and provide comfort and Christ-centered support for as long <u>after</u> as needed.

What that actually looks like depends on the situation, the needs and concerns of the care receiver, the relational and caring skill of the Stephen Minister, and the extent to which both Care Receiver and Care Provider allow

Christ to be part of the relationship.

A Stephen Minister typically has only one care receiver at a time and meets with that person once a week for about an hour. The caring relationship lasts for as long as the need persists.

Stephen Ministers are often thought of as "The After People." People to care and comfort after the acute crisis has passed: After the funeral when everyone has left and the casseroles and cards have stopped coming, for example; or after the doctor says, "I'm sorry, but there's nothing more we can do."

Stephen Ministers

are congregation members specially trained to offer confidential, one-on-one care to people who are hurting or experiencing a difficult life situation, such as grief, divorce, job loss or retirement, chronic or terminal illness, relocation or any felt traumatic experience.

The Stephen Ministry training program is a high-quality, Christ-centered program. Learners complete 50 hours of training, which is a mix of presentations, readings, group discussion, skill practice, and spiritual growth activities.

Potential care receivers first meet with a member of clergy or a Stephen Leader, who assesses their needs for care and matches them with a Stephen Minister.

A guiding principle of Stephen Ministries is that Care Providers are not trained to provide counseling services; they are in no way a substitute for professional mental healthcare. At the same time, a Stephen Ministry relationship is not intended as a social relationship. But rather Stephen Ministers are trained to be present, to attentively and intentionally listen and to provide Christ-centered care to a hurting person.

Currently there are II active Stephen Ministers, including three Stephen Leaders. Leaders include Pat Barton, Dianne Silliman, and Michele Johnson. Active Stephen Ministers are Martha Belury, Craig Tuthill, Roberta Morton, Phil Glandon, Jodi Hess, Andi Waller, Joanne Drew, and Dan Morton.
