### Saint Mark's Hosts Successful World Culture and Artisan Fair





They came.

They admired. - They bought.

The Culture and Artisans Fair, held on a gloriously pleasant Saturday, May 6, attracted some 600 visitors who purchased crafts, clothing, accessories and international foodstuffs from the 20 vendors who hailed from 9 nations. "It exceeded all of our hopes and expectations," said Joyce Acton of Saint Mark's Migration Ministries Committee.

Saint Mark's along with CRIS, Community Refugee & Immigration Services, organized the event with support from a \$1,000 grant from the City of Upper Arlington Community Relations Committee. The goals included helping local residents become better acquainted with those arriving from other countries, making new arrivals feel a part of central Ohio and offering the new arrivals an opportunity to sell their crafts or native foods to help support themselves and their families.

Those goals were met.


#### Choral Matins - June 4

The morning of June 4 (Trinity Sunday), the Saint Mark's Choir will conclude its season with a special service of Choral Matins with Holy Eucharist, taking the place of the usual 10:30 a.m. service of Holy Eucharist. Choral Matins, or Morning Prayer, is the morning counterpart to Choral Evensong, alternating prayers, readings, and inspiring music.

The service can stand alone or proceed directly to the Offertory and Communion of a regular service of Holy Eucharist, which is how we will be doing it that morning. Music will include the stirring Morning Service in B-flat by Charles Villiers Stanford. responses by John Reading, and anthems by Jan Pieterszoon Sweelinck and Thomas Tallis.

#### Trinity Sunday

Trinity Sunday is a feast that celebrates "the one and equal glory" of Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, "in Trinity of Persons and in Unity of Being" (BCP, p. 380). It is celebrated on the first Sunday after Pentecost. Trinity Sunday is one of the seven principal feasts of the church year (BCP, p. 15). The Hymnal 1982 presents ten hymns in a section on The Holy Trinity (Hymns 362-371), including "Holy, holy, holy! Lord God Almighty!" (Hymn 362), "Come, thou almighty King" (Hymn 365), and "Holy Father, great Creator" (Hymn 368). From An Episcopal Dictionary of the Church

Sales totaling \$8,500 were paid directly to the artisans, according to Joyce. "I am sure no one really knew what to expect, but several (vendors) expressed that they were pleasantly surprised at the results," Joyce said. Brenda Hammersley of the Migration Ministries Committee said a survey of the vendors showed all were pleased with the event and would like to participate in another fair next year. Plus, a survey of attendees showed they enjoyed the fair and would look forward to a similar event next year.

Saint Mark's, CRIS and the Community Relations Committee will decide whether to hold another fair next year. "We hope to build on the success of the first one and hopefully this will become a fixture in the calendar of both Saint Mark's and Upper Arlington," Pastor Vicki said.

#### Refuge Resettlement—CRIS Offers Critical Services to Those in Need

First Sunday Outreach Project Recap By Bill Mayr

The numbers are huge, the challenges daunting. Welcome to the world of refugee resettlement.

Resettlement was the focus of May's First Sunday presentation at Saint Mark's, which featured Flannery Rokeby-Jackson, volunteer coordinator for Community Refugee & Immigration Services (CRIS), which is a Columbus-based affiliate of Church World Services, one of sever-

will be multiple interviews, medical exams and security checks. For those coming to America, the U.S. takes out loans in the refugee's name for airline tickets but expects them to start repaying the loans when they are resettled and working.

This is where CRIS enters the picture. CRIS, with about 20 of its 50 staff members (plus volunteers) work-

al large non-profits which work on resettlement with the federal government.

CRIS and Flannery teamed up recently with Saint Mark's on the Culture and Artisan Fair held May 6, featuring vendors from South America, Africa, Asia and Europe.


A mid-2022 United Nations report said there were an estimated 32.5 million refugees around the globe and another 4.9 million asylum-seekers. Gaining refugee status and being resettled is no easy process, sometimes requiring a wait for resettlement of up to 25 to 35 years, Flannery said. For example, Cheka, who participated in the Artisans Fair, is a native of the Democratic Republic of the Congo; she spent 15 years in a refugee camp before arriving in the U.S. last year.

"It's not an easy process; it's a hard and long process to get accepted and get resettled," Flannery said. There

ing on resettlement, offers legal, medical, education, employment and other services. CRIS is notified of resettlements a few weeks to a few days prior to arrival; CRIS will find rental units and set up apartments with furniture, food and other necessities. They will enroll children in school, start teaching English, help find jobs and generally explain how American society operates.

"Fleeing your home is traumatic. Living in a refugee settlement is traumatic. But being resettled in a new home is the most traumatic," Flannery said. Clients receive CRIS assistance anywhere from a few months to three years.

Clients resettled last year tallied more than 500; this year the count is expected to surpass 700 and for 2024 possibly as many as 900. Volunteers are needed in a variety of roles. Contact Saint Mark's Migration Ministry Committee or Flannery at 614-809-8255 or *frokebyjack-son@cris-ohio.org*.

#### Resettlement Terms To Know

The terms for those seeking admission to the United States are sometimes used interchangeably. Here are some definitions.

Refugee: A person who is outside his or her country of nationality who is unable or unwilling to return to that country because of persecution or a well-founded fear of persecution. Persecution, or the fear thereof, may be based on: race, religion, nationality, membership in a social group or political opinion. Those seeking refugee status must apply and receive this status from the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees.

Asylum seeker: A person seeking protection from danger in his or her home country but whose claim for refugee status hasn't been determined. Asylum seekers must apply for protection in the county of destination; they must arrive at the border or cross the border to apply. Entrance is not illegal at official U.S. Ports of Entry and is protected by national and international law. Entrance elsewhere is illegal for border crossings but asylum seekers will be given the opportunity to make their case. Not every asylum seeker will be granted refugees status or accepted into the U.S.

Immigrant: A person who makes a conscious decision to leave his or her home and move to a foreign country with the intention of settling there. Immigrants are free to return home whenever they choose.

Migrant: A person who moves from place to place in his or her home country or across borders, generally for economic reasons such as seasonal work. As with immigrants, migrants are not forced to leave their native countries because of persecution or violence but rather are seeking better opportunities.

One group stayed behind, just to clean up the kitchen so the organ recital reception team could get into the kitchen to start their preparation. It was a true team effort.
