## **UA Farmer's Market**

## Move to Prosper

Saint Mark's was the host location on June 17 for the very first high school graduation celebration for Move to PROSPER, and organization that Saint Mark's Outreach Committee has pledged to support for three years.

Move to PROSPER (MTP) is a three-year program that empowers low wage families and their children to gain economic security. The 10 pilot families raised their incomes by 58%, or \$17,000 on average, and improved their mental and physical health.

Members of the pilot class gathered in our space the day before Father's Day to celebrate the graduation of the first two of 18 total children from that pilot class. One will go on to University of Cincinnati and major in Surgical Technology. The other will enroll as a premed student at OSU this August.

MTP, with the support of a donor, made \$1,000 gifts to the graduates that they may put toward expenses, books and meals as they head off to college. All 18 children will be celebrated the same way until the last one graduates - in 2033!



## World Refugee Day 2023

What do the Web, Google, doughnuts, the Mini Cooper, polio vaccine and Curious George all have in common? They are the creations of refugees.

Each year, June 20 is the day designated by the United Nations to honor and celebrate refugees around the world, an opportunity to highlight the journeys and risks refugees face and to advocate for their protection. The Secretary-General of the United Nations reports that the total number of displaced people has reached 100 million. He goes on to say that International Law makes clear that seeking asylum is a fundamental human right, that people escaping violence or persecution must be able to cross borders safely, and that they must be treated with respect and given opportunities to heal, to learn, to work and to thrive. Refugees enrich their local communities, creating a cultural diversity within the local population and helping nurture understanding and appreciation for social diversity.

There are numerous studies with supporting statistics that indicate the positive economic impact refugees have had on the United States economy. According to the Herman Legal Group, refugees have a high employment rate and more people of working age. Refugees make America stronger by contributing billions of dollars annually through consumer spending and entrepreneurship. They help revitalize declining communities and instead create vibrant communities

Many communities throughout the world celebrate World Refugee Day (or sometimes week) with special events. This year the Columbus City Council, as part of Immigrant Heritage Month and World Refugee Day, recognized the Bhutanese community. The Bhutanese Community of Central Ohio organization provides services, education and hope to more than 28,000 Bhutanese and other South Asian resettled refugees.

Saint Mark's Migration Ministry encourages you to join our migration ministry at Saint Mark's. Consider donating, fundraising, volunteering for agencies such as CRIS that help refugees in their settlement process. Gaining and sharing awareness of the current issues of refugees, creating solidarity with them, is a huge step toward following the teaching of Jesus—"Do onto others as you would have others do onto you."





## Saint Mark's at UA Pride Festival

Despite the intermittent downpours, there was a steady crowd of people stopping by our booth at the UA Pride Festival held June 11 at Sunny 95Park and Amelita Barn.

Last year, Saint Mark's was the only church to have any sort of presence. This year, we were one of four churches with a booth (along with being a sponsor of the event). A number of Saint Marks parishioners stopped by to say hello and talk with people. We've got lots of ideas to keep the momentum going for next year."

Pastor Zust said, "I am so proud that Saint Mark's is an integral part of publicly supporting the LGBTQI+ community in Upper Arlington. It is more important than ever that we stand with the people in that community."

## Help NNEMAP Raise Money Volunteer as a Fair Parker for a few hours

The NNEMAP food pantry is located directly across the street from the south entrance to the Ohio State Fair. NNEMAP closes the pantry for the two weeks of the fair and sells its parking spaces to fair-goers. This raises over \$10,000 for NNEMAP.

The NNEMAP partner churches each take a day during the fair to assist, providing volunteers to serve as parkers. Saint Mark's day is Monday, Aug. I. We need 12 volunteers to take a shift. Shifts are from 8 a.m. to noon, noon to 4 p.m. and 4 to 8 p.m. NNEMAP staff supervise the site during all shifts. Chairs, tent coverage, snacks and bathrooms are available for workers.

The NNEMAP food pantry is experiencing a crunch. Usage of the pantry is at a record high. At the same time the cost for each family served is up by 36%. So, if you can, please drop some food items in the boxes near the front doors. There is an immediate need for canned meat (chicken, tuna, ham, Spam and so forth).

Did you get a toothbrush from your dentist? If it's not what you use, consider putting it in the NNEMAP boxes. There is always a need for toothbrushes and toothpaste!

## July Collection for School Supplies

Last year, Saint Mark's donated stuffed bookbags to the children of Vinton County. Outreach decided to donate through our partners at Help Me Grow as there were so many other groups collecting for the Franklin County schools. As it turned out, Saint Mark's was the only entity that provided students with book bags in all of Vinton County. Some of the recipients were moved to tears at the generosity. During the school year the bags could be seen around town on the backs of students so we know they were appreciated. Once again, Saint Mark's is collecting schools supplies for the Vinton County students. We would like to stuff at least a hundred backpacks. Will you help us reach our goal?

Either fill the bag with the supplies on the list or put \$20 in a bag and Outreach will fill it for you. Outreach will supply the backpack and a water bottle to go with the supplies.

Back-to-School sales at retailers start in July so it is a good time to shop.

The last day to drop off supplies is Aug. I.

We will deliver the bags the first week of August to allow distribution prior to the start of school.

## St Mark's Episcopal Church Grief Support: When grief is complicated By Brenda Hammersley, RN, MSN, MBA, Certified Grief Counselor

# "No one every told me that grief felt so like fear." C.S. Lewis, A Grief Observed

Grief is evidence of love and a life changing experience. The bereaved among us work hard to reconstruct their lives and find a sense of meaning and purpose over time. But what if grief doesn't evolve into a life where the deceased is remembered with more happiness than sorrow or anger? We refer to that as complicated grief (CG)—a label that recently earned a place in the Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders as Prolonged Grief Disorder (PGD). Because of the destructive impact of CG/PGD on people, mental health experts, therapists and counselors are beginning to refine what such a diagnosis means and how to treat it.

The worm at the core of CG/PGD is the experience of unrelenting suffering that destroys hope and takes all joy from life. Feeling stunned by many different emotions, experiencing exhaustion and a lack of interest in life is normal in the early months or years after a death. But, over time, the pain should become less intense as you find the overwhelming memories of the death are still accessible but not filling your every thought. In other words, the pain of grief is transformed as you adapt to the loss and reconstruct your life. But in CG/PGD, the intensity *never* lessens, and your inner life becomes full of sorrow, pain, anger, guilt and hopelessness, despite how you may appear to others.

Every bereaved person has a unique process and personal timeline for how they'll adapt to their loss. But when adaptation doesn't happen, the bereaved person will experience more than a few years of feeling something is terribly wrong and that the world is not a good place. They'll also experience unrelenting yearning for and preoccupation with the deceased and will have at least 3 of 8 additional symptoms that include "disbelief, intense emotional pain, feelings of identity confusion,

avoidance of reminders of the loss, feelings of numbness, intense loneliness, meaninglessness, or difficulty engaging in ongoing life" (DSM 5, 2020). The Center for Complicated Grief at Columbia University states that CG/PGD is grief which takes hold of a person's mind and won't let go. When this happens, the bereaved person cannot imagine ever feeling better, watches their relationships fail, and believes life has no purpose. People with CG/PGD don't know what's wrong and feel their lives have been damaged beyond repair. They persist in:

Imagining alternative scenarios for the death

- Engaging in caregiver self-blame or anger
- Judging their grief
- Feeling survivor guilt
- Avoiding grief triggers
- · Being unable to move forward with life
- Being unable to connect with others

The confusing part of all this is that PGD symptoms are a lot like those of normal early grief. But if you're not finding hope, meaning and purpose in your life years after a loss please reach out to a grief specialist to find the best resource for your needs. The Saint Mark's Grief Support Group is a starting place for healing your pain and reconstructing a hopeful future.
