

Shrove Tuesday - February 13

The Mark's Men will be serving up an All-Parish Shrove Tuesday Pancake Dinner on Tuesday, February 21 at 6:00!

Shrovetide is a pre-Lenten period that culminates on Shrove Tuesday, which is the day before Ash Wednesday, marking the beginning of the season of Lent. It gets its name from the old English word 'shrive," which means "to confess" or "to impose penance." Traditionally viewed as a day of repentance, Shrove Tuesday has become regarded as the last day for celebration and feasting before entering the Lenten season of spiritual discipline, reflection, fasting, penance, and prayer. It was also a time to use up foods of indulgence, such as meat and sugar and foods with fat like milk, butter, and eggs, which would otherwise spoil. (This is why some refer to Shrove Tuesday as Fat Tuesday, or it's French translation, Mardi Gras.) Pancakes were seen as an easy way to use up milk, butter, eggs and sugar in one meal.

So, however you like your pancakes: - with lemon juice and powdered sugar or maple syrup and loads of butter, Nutella, whipped cream, or all of the above --come and celebrate this pre-Lenten tradition! There is no charge to attend, however, donations to cover costs will be accepted. Note: The nursery will NOT be staffed as we have great high chairs and we love kids and kids love pancakes!



Ash Wednesday - February 14

Lent begins on Ash Wednesday – this year Ash Wednesday is February 14. On Ash Wednesday we impose ashes – made from blessed palms- on the forehead as a reminder that we are all mortal and that we have all sinned and fallen short of the glory of God.

We will have three services on Ash Wednesday.: 8 a.m., Noon and 7:30 p.m.. The 7:30 p.m. service will be livestreamed. If you wish to have ashes sent to you to use during the livestreamed service, please let the Parish office know.

We will also be participating in "Ashes to Go" this year. If you wish to receive Ashes and are unable to attend any of the Ash Wednesday services, you can come to the vestibule by the red doors from 10:30 - 11:30 a.m. or 4-6 pFasting or Giving Something Up

Giving something up for Lent is a traditional type of fast. People usually pick something that is an extra and give it up for the 40 days of Lent. Often giving up an extra is accompanied by giving the money that would have been spent on that item to charity. Sundays are feast days and not part of the season of Lent so many people do not fast on Sunday. Some common things that people give up are: chocolate, ice cream, red meat, alcohol, and eating out.

Prayer, Reflection and Bible Study

Many people add daily prayers, Bible reading or time for reflection to their schedules during Lent. Prayers can be added at the beginning of the day, at noon, in the early evening or at the end of the day or any of the above. In the arched bookcase in the Parish Hall you will find the following resources to use at home:

Forward Day by Day which is a small book of daily short reflections on the daily office readings.


A booklet of theological reflections – one for each week of Lent.

Lent Madness is a fun and popular activity that is disguised as a competition, but it's actually an online devotion and a great way to learn about Saints while giving to a good cause. It is a tournament, like March Madness. Each day during Lent participants from around the world cast their votes among competing saints. The saint with the most votes is crowned with the "Golden Halo."

Saint Mark's will have a Lent Madness pool. To join, fill out a bracket (available at **www.lentmadenss.org** or in the arched bookcase) and submit it - along with \$5 - to Pastor Vicki by February 14 The winner of the Saint Mark's pool will be get to decide where to donate the funds.

- 5:30 p.m. Simple Supper. Gather for a simple Soup & bread supper. There will be a sign-up sheet in the Parish Hall so folks can take turns providing soup and bread each week.
- 6:15 7:15 p.m. Pysanky Egg Workshop. Pysanky is the art of applying wax to eggs and then dying them. It is a multi-step process and ends with beautiful eggs ready for Easter. Join us in the Parish Hall.
- **7:30 7:45 p.m. Compline**. Compline is the night prayer of the church. It has been prayed by Christians for over 1000 years. We will gather in the church for Compline.

The Wednesday evening program will be held: February 21, 28 and March 6, 13, and 20.

PASTORAL CARE - STEPHEN MINISTRY

Saint Mark's Active Ministry of Compassionate Listening

You may not know much about our Stephen Ministry because it is a "quieter" but active ministry in the church. Phil Glandon, one of our long-time Stephen Ministers, feels that this ministry is "one piece of Saint Mark's warm blanket of pastoral care". All of us at Saint Mark's share care and concern with our church family in many ways, and our pastor Vicki provides us with her counsel and leadership. In addition, our Stephen Ministers provide individual members of our congregation with one-to-one Christ-centered care. They become listening companions for those who are experiencing a new and/or difficult sit-

uation in their lives. Stephen Ministers are equipped with caring ministry skills through several months of training.

Our Stephen

Ministers do not provide answers but instead are compassionate listeners and companions. They typically have one care receiver at a time and meet with that person on a regular basis to listen to thoughts and concerns and to help the person feel God's love and presence. The caring relationship lasts as long as the need exists, and all meetings and information shared are kept confidential. We have found that Stephen Ministers and their care receivers often become friends and continue their friendship even after the Stephen Ministry relationship is no longer needed.

The Stephen Ministry program was founded in 1975 by The Rev. Kenneth Haugk, a clinical psychologist and Lutheran pastor who saw a need for lay ministers to provide regular caring visits to parishioners in their churches who were experiencing a difficult time of life (examples: a move, loss of a job, a family death, loneliness, illness, or a family crisis). The ministry has grown throughout the world and now includes over 13,000 congregations in over 30 countries. At Saint Mark's our ministry was started 24 years ago and has continued since then. We currently have seven Stephen Ministers and three Stephen Leaders.

Pat Barton continues as a Stephen Leader and mentor to all. Michele Johnson and Dianne Silliman are our other Stephen Leaders. Our current Stephen Ministers include: Dan Morton, Roberta Morton, Craig Tuthill, Jodie Hess, Joanne Drew, Phil Glandon, and Barb Wiseman.

Adult Formation


During the month of February, the Adult Formation program will be looking at various translations of the Bible into English. We'll explore how they are different and the same and how they all came to be.

Children's Formation



CANDIDATES FOR ELECTION

The vestry is the governing body of the parish and consists of 15 members of the parish who are elected by the congregation. It is the vestry's responsibility to be the final decision-making body that hires the rector, approves the parish budget, makes parish policy decisions and spends the parish's money on mission, ministry and maintenance.

The vestry consists of a senior warden, a junior warden, and a youth warden (high school age), each of whom are elected by the parish for a 1-year term. (Wardens may serve up to 3 consecutive 1-year terms.) The other 12 members of the vestry are elected for 3-year terms, normally with 4 members elected each year. At its first meeting in each calendar year, the vestry appoints a treasurer and a clerk. The treasurer and clerk are not voting members of the vestry by virtue of being appointed to office.

The Nominating Committee is made up of retiring vestry members, the senior and junior wardens, and the clergy. This year's Nominating Committee included Cheryl Boop, Kevin Fix, Jodi Hess, Julia Johnson-Davis, Roman Skoracki and Vicki Zust.

Saint Mark's is entitled to send four delegates each year to the annual Diocesan Convention. Two of the four delegate slots are filled by the senior and junior wardens, ex officio. The other two delegates are elected at the annual meeting. The 150^{th} Diocesan Convention will take place November 22-23 at the Roberts Centre in Wilmington.

CONVENTION DELEGATE (2 TO BE ELECTED)




Michael Bowman

Habitat Lunch Adventure

It was a cold and snowy morning when we left Saint Mark's to take lunch to the Habitat for Humanity workers. When we arrived at Arlington Road in Linden, everything on the street was quiet except for the Habitat House, which was a beehive of activity. As we looked for parking, one of the workers was in the open doorway watching for us; they were excited lunch was on the way.

The house is framed, but there are no doors, windows or even a roof, so we set up lunch on a piece of plywood, and the crew quickly dug into the sloppy joes.
