

Second Annual Culture and Artisans Fair May 4



Saint Mark's will host the second Culture and Artisans Fair on the first Saturday in May. We will again partner with CRIS (Community Refugee and Immigration Services) and the City of Upper Arlington to showcase the artistic creations of those individuals who are in the refugee or asylum-seeking process as well as those who have become citizens after migration to avoid persecution.

These artisans will offer for sale handmade crafts, clothing, foods and other cultural items representing their homelands. There will also be food trucks where you can buy Mexican, Asian and South African foods. A special performance will feature Latin music in the middle of the day with global music throughout the day.

The fair provides plenty of opportunities to lend a hand – helping with set-up before the event starts on Saturday morning is a great way to work with other parishioners to prepare for the artisans. After the event we need help with removing the trash, signage, and chairs. Other volunteer roles include acting as a Saint Mark's Ambassador by answering questions, helping our artisans with rest breaks, bringing them water, and guiding our visitors to the restroom or food vendors. We are anticipating a large crowd this year and hoping for "all-hands-on-deck" for this festive day.

Many volunteer opportunities are broken into 2 ½ or 3-hour segments which allow you to help and still have a chance to shop and eat. Choral Matins May 26

The morning of Sunday, May 26 (Trinity Sunday), the Saint Mark's Choir will conclude its season with a special service of Choral Matins with Holy Eucharist, taking the place of the usual 10:30 a.m. service of Holy Eucharist. Choral Matins, or Morning Prayer, is the morning counterpart to Choral Evensong, alternating prayers, readings, and inspiring music. The service can stand alone or proceed directly to the Offertory and Communion of a regular service of Holy Eucharist, which is how we will be doing it that morning.



Newly installed Plaques Commemorate Saint Mark's Organ Completion

Three large plaques now hang on the wall behind the organ console. The signs bear the names of those whose generous donations financed the completion of Saint Mark's organ.

The organ originally was built in 1987 by Casavant Frères of Saint-Hyacinthe, Quebec, as their opus 3616. The original 1987 instrument was designed by Jean-Louis Coignet, then the firm's Artistic and Tonal Director, in collaboration with Gary L. Garber, then the Organist-Choirmaster at Saint Mark's. The original instrument comprised 21 stops, 27 ranks, and 1601 pipes on two manuals and pedal.

Original plans called for a fuller instrument, and in 2015 Saint Mark's contracted with Casavant to enlarge and complete the parish organ. The adapted completion plan included the creation of a new expressive division and a new, movable console with three manual keyboards. Completed in July 2016, the instrument now comprises 35 stops, 41 ranks, and 2450 pipes.

Saint Mark's and NNEMAP—Years of Shared Service to Help Others

NNEMAP's history goes back to 1958 when construction of I-670 disrupted the area's "Flytown" neighborhoods so drastically that home values plummeted. Within three months of the highway's construction, a new population of disadvantaged persons needed emergency services. Central Ohio church communities stepped in and first opened a food pantry in 1969 that grew over time to become the Near Northside Emergency Material Assistance Program (NNEMAP).

Saint Mark's has been actively involved with NNEMAP for decades. Parishioners volunteer at the pantry, deliver groceries to shut-ins, help park cars to raise funds for NNEMAP during the Ohio State Fair, provide donations through the year and at Christmas, and take part in NNEMAP's annual Harmony for Hunger concert each year.

One of our annual outreach projects is to provide diapers and spice packets for NNEMAP families. On the second Wednesday of every month members of Saint Mark's gather to bundle diapers and make spice packets. Usually there are about 10 members that participate in this event. The next Diapers and Spices session will take place at 10:30 a.m. Wednesday, April 10, in the Canterbury Center.

Saint Mark's is one of two churches that provide most of the diapers for NNEMAP. We bundle the diapers in groups of 10 for sizes 4, 5 and 6 and make approximately 90 bundles (which means 900 diapers!) Also, we create 100 spice packets for roasted vegetables. NNEMAP Updates and Opportunities

Food Pantry: NNEMAP continues to set records in the numbers of clients who qualify for and come to the pantry each week. The need is clear – in February 2024 71% more families were served compared to February 2023. Food Pantry volunteers are needed for a variety of tasks. Refrigerated Lockers: NNEMAP has installed 15 refrigerated lockers which are now in operation for individuals and families who are not able to pick up groceries during normal operating hours. The lockers function like Amazon lockers with qualifying families given an access code once they place a request through NNEMAP's website. They then have 48 hours to collect their groceries. The lockers are available 24 hours a day and seven days a week making this a good option for the working poor. NNEMAP is happy that 94 clients used the locker option in the first month since it became available.

Pantry needs this month: Canned meat products, canned pasta with meat products, kitchen-size trash bags, toilet paper, toothbrushes, detergent pods, dog and cat food.

Celebrate the Earth at Procter Farm

Procter Center Farm is a production and educational, six-acre, diversified vegetable and livestock farm in central Ohio. The property includes black raspberries, hazelnut, and apple orchards, and asparagus, swiss chard, and strawberry patches. Though not certified, we use only use organic, generative practices to grow our food. To extend our growing season, we have 12 boxed beds, a high tunnel, and greenhouse. We also raise market hogs, and chickens for meat and eggs.

The farm contributes to the robust meal options in the Procter Dining Hall. The food service staff work with the farmer to coordinate meals based on what will be harvested that week. You can also find our delicious vegetables, pork, and chicken selling at three locations in the greater Columbus area.

The months of June through September, we offer up to 30 Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) shares. Members provide the capital the farm needs at the beginning of the growing season. In return, they receive a weekly box filled with the freshest picked vegetables and seasonal specialties, like flowers and pumpkins!

Education

Our farm is a learning lab for volunteers and visitors of all ages and backgrounds. Each year, we have hundreds of hours of educational experiences that also help us grow thousands of servings of vegetables.

Programing

Our farm provides a safe space for camp activities that include harvesting for Procter Center Kitchen, dying eggs, painting pumpkins, and building scare crows.

Production

Our farm works with community organizations to provide people with greater access to fresh, locally grown food.

Honey from our fields

We partner with Dunham Bees to provide seasonal, raw, local honey. Our site is home to over 30 bee hives, which are maintained by second generation Beekeeper, Matt Dunham.

CAMPUS GROUNDS AND BUILDING MAINTENANCE

Trinity Guild Fund Provides Safety Net for Maintenance and Repair

Some people never seem to age, but the same can't be said about church buildings. A pair of significant maintenance projects were completed recently at Saint Mark's.

The large moveable wall between the sanctuary and the parish hall underwent general maintenance and replacement of its carpet covering. The Vestry approved spending \$5,500 from the parish operating budget for the work.

Separately, the Vestry approved removing the drinking fountain near the kitchen, capping the water line and repairing the wall. The cost will be roughly \$500, with the funds coming from the operating budget. "The low usage of that fountain did not justify the cost of replacing it," Junior Warden Kevin Fix said.

The other major project was maintenance on the large skylight over the altar and the chancel. "Some of the caulking had deteriorated and was blocking some of the channels that allowed for proper water drainage. The work that was done involved resealing and re-caulking the entire skylight, and much of the cost was for lift equipment that was needed to do the work," Kevin said.

The Vestry approved spending \$12,000 from the Trinity Guild Fund for the project. Treasurer Phil Glandon described the fund as for unexpected maintenance and repairs. "It's money set aside or donated for repairs like whenever the boiler breaks or the roof leaks and we don't have money budgeted for it. This gives us flexibility."

The parish history on the Saint Mark's website shows the Trinity fund being given responsibility for buildings and grounds in 1992. In 2019, Saint Mark's received a bequest of \$336,000 from deceased parishioners Lynne and John Muskoff, of which \$150,000 went to the Trinity Guild Fund. Roof leaks, drainage issues and other major items have been addressed with money from the fund, which currently has nearly \$52,000, Phil said.

Those who wish to donate to the fund can do so by making a contribution in whatever manner they usually donate, and indicating the money is for the Trinity Guild.

As junior warden, Kevin is participating in the Diocesan Facilities and Grounds Consortium. "The consortium is made up of representatives from a dozen or so parishes in the diocese right now, and more are joining as the word spreads. We try to meet virtually once a month and

focus on a specific topic in each meeting," he said.

"Recent topics have included HVAC systems and sustainability, and the topic for the April meeting is building security. I think this group will be a good way for us to gain insight from others in the diocese and share best practices."
