Pet Blessing

St. Francis of Assisi is remembered as the patron saint of animals and the environment. Born in Italy in 1182, he was known for his commitment to justice and deep love of all creation. Francis died on Oct. 3, 1226. The church celebrates his life and ministry each year on Oct. 4; Saint Mark's will bless pets in remembrance of St. Francis on Sunday, Oct. 6.

There's no doubt that pets enrich our lives. Don't miss two opportunities to acknowledge the special relationship you have with your pet. The first is a Saint. Mark's tradition. Bring your pet with you to either the 8 or 10:30 a.m. service on Sunday, Oct. 6. You can bring your stuffed pets, too. You can also bring photos of your pets, either those who won't do well worshipping in person or those who are no longer with us, whom you would like to have remembered.

The second is for pets who are not well-suited to attending an entire worship service. Pastor Vicki will be on the front lawn of the church from 9:15 a.m. to 10:15 a.m. Sunday, Oct. 6. You can drop by with your pet for a blessing. We will publicize this in the community, too, so be sure to invite your friends to bring their pets by for a blessing.

CARING FOR GOD'S GIFTS

Annual Stewardship Campaign

The theme for our stewardship campaign this year is Walk in Love, and it calls us to remember that our greatest gift in community is how we align and come together in purpose and mission. When we walk in the same direction, we can accomplish so many things.

Saint Mark's is a visible symbol of the love of God in our community. We host immigrants and refugees and welcome all worshipers proudly with open arms. Our presence is felt through the support we show for our youth involved in arts and athletics and our participation in community events. We attract visitors seeking beautiful music, and our space is open and welcoming to community groups of all ages and backgrounds. We feed the hungry, support new mothers in Appalachia and help provide housing for families seeking security and opportunity. We gather to worship and learn, to play and eat. Saint Mark's is an important part of the community in Upper Arlington and beyond.



All of this is possible because our members give their time and expertise to make it happen. Sunday worship services depend on ushers, lectors, choir members, chalice bearers, acolytes, livestream producers and many more. Youth group depends on leaders. Outreach depends on many people being willing to help.

Eighty percent of our annual budget comes from pledges. We have about 100 households who pledged to Saint Mark's for 2024. To fund the worship, ministries and activities of Saint Mark's in 2025 at our current level, we will need \$500,000 in pledge income. In 2024 our pledge income was budgeted at \$472,000.

Everyone has a role to play in helping us meet the goal of \$500,000 in pledge income.

Saint Mark's depends on your gifts. All of our programs and activities depend on people giving of their time, talents and treasures to make them happen.

We will kick off the Stewardship Campaign on Sunday, Oct. 13. Look for a letter with your pledge card in the mail the week before that Sunday. We will celebrate our abundance on Sunday, Nov. 3, as we remember all those who have gone before us and who built the foundation on which we stand.

Rector's Discretionary Fund

Saint Mark's has a Rector's Discretionary Fund that is maintained in several ways, including donations from church members.

According to a policy enacted by the Vestry, fund money can be spent at the discretion of the rector for the following purposes:

- Relief of the poor and indigent.
- Purchase of materials and supplies for programs of Saint Mark's that are not part of the annual budget.
- Purchase of advertising in programs for community events to raise the profile of Saint Mark's.
- Contributions to community non-profit agencies on behalf of and in the name of Saint Mark's.
- Fees for the rector and/or members of the congregation to attend events that will benefit the life of Saint Mark's (e.g. youth events, summer camp, diocesan events).
- Purchase of tokens of appreciation for members of the congregation – not to exceed \$50 per item.

Pastor Vicki uses the fund for all of these purposes over the course of the year. If you would like to contribute to the discretionary fund, you can do so in any of the ways you normally give to the church, just mark your contribution as in support of the discretionary fund.

SPOTLIGHT ON LIVE STREAMING

When COVID-19 swept across Ohio in 2020, Saint Mark's took a technological leap of faith: the church installed technology allowing it to livestream Sunday services on its website and on Facebook. The goal was basic, but important: allow the congregation to worship together even though they were separated because of the pandemic.

Four years later, the livestreaming aspect of Saint Mark's has evolved considerably, according to Mark Drew, who as junior warden at the time was among those who developed the livestreaming operation. He continues today as Livestream Producer for the parish. "The pandemic precipitated it. We could have done (the technology) just enough to get by cheaply. But we had some good advice from professionals and developed a more extensive, higher quality production."

The livestream of the 10:30 a.m. Sunday service draws regular viewers every week, Mark said. Others tune in when they are ill or out of town for the weekend, plus "we have people who go south for the winter and they attend every Sunday by livestream. I even did this; we were out in Seattle, realized what time it was, turned on my phone, fired up the website and we were there."

Like other leaps of faith, Saint Mark's livestreaming has produced unexpected outcomes. While there are about 15 to 20 real-time viewers of the Sunday services, roughly 85 viewers watch the livestream version at other times during the week, Mark said. The most recent broadcast is available on the Saint Mark's website all week and an archive of previous services also is easily accessible.

"It's on-demand; I think the phrase is 'time-shifting.' You have a grandkids soccer game in the morning and then tune into the service in the afternoon. When we started doing this, it was for a live broadcast. But this aspect really has developed," Mark said.

The traditional, in-person religious service and the online version have become intermingled. "We had a baptism about two months ago, prior to the baptism the family had been attending virtually. We have other examples of that, people who have said they've been watching the livestream for months and this is their first time in the doors of the church," Mark said.

"We kind of now assume most of the families coming into the church (as new members) have been watching online before they come in person. They are church-shopping online. I think that's really good for us because I think our broadcast, our production style, it's a really good experience,"

Assistants with the online broadcasts include Alex and George Reed and Junior Warden Kevin Fix. In addition to Sunday Eucharists, the team has broadcast memorial services, evensongs, Taize services, weddings, baptisms during Sunday services and a Scout court of honor. More volunteer assistants are welcome.

Mark said he's hopeful about future livestreaming efforts of Saint Mark's and how they can support an important goal of the church: "New faces. We should always be welcoming new faces. I think I'm hopeful because we do things we should be doing, outreach, active in the community, energy in the congregation. I think you can make the case that with everything you hear about declining attendance (at churches), I think we're doing quite well."

As for livestreaming: "I think it has turned out better than anybody thought it might."

FORMATION AND WORSHIP

Children's Formation

Children's Formation begins at 10:30 a.m. Sundays in the children's formation area. Children from age 4 through first grade participate in the Godly Play program. Godly Play is a Montessori-style program. It starts with the telling of a story along with some exploration questions, and then the children are invited to explore the story in ways that appeal to them.

Children from second through fifth grades participate in the Children's Chapel program. The Children's Chapel program this year will explore the readings for the first Sundays of the month and will feed ideas, questions and thoughts to Pastor Vicki to work into her sermon on the first Sunday of each month.

All children return to the service around the time of the peace. Children's Formation programs do not meet on

the first Sunday of the month, because that is when the Canterbury Choir sings.

Adult Formation

In September and October the Adult Formation program is exploring Christianity After Constantine. We are looking at the period of church history when Christianity moved from being a persecuted group of outsiders to the religion of an empire and what came out of that change. Some highlights include the development of the canon of Scripture and the Nicene Creed.

Adult Formation meets in the parish hall from 9:30-10:15 a.m. on Sunday morning. Christianity After Constantine will continue on Oct. 13 and 20. There is no adult formation on Oct. 6 because of the pet blessing or on Oct. 27 because of the pulpit swap. Videos of these classes can be found on the adult formation page of the website.

Outreach Summit Celebrates Ministries

Attendees at the Outreach Summit on Sept. 22 were excited by updates on support provided to Saint Mark's community-focused ministries in the first 7 months of 2024. Through July, over \$31,714 was used by Outreach to help others. This number does not reflect an additional \$4,000 in school supplies, grooming supplies, food and infant items donated by parishioners, nor does it reflect the hundreds of hours they give in supporting projects to relieve hunger, reduce homelessness, help families, assist refugees and back other Episcopal efforts.

Outreach Summits are a forum for discussions and decisions about the direction and future of Saint Mark's community ministries. Attendees at the Summit discussed and approved the following:

- ⇒ Labor Day Bake Sale proceeds will be donated for hunger relief through the Tri-Village Packers and NNEMAP
- ⇒ A \$1,000 donation will be made to the Haitian Community Help & Support Center in Springfield
- ⇒ Outreach will look at ways to continue support of Families Flourish during the 2025 budget process

Each ministry leader provided plans for the remainder of the year which are funded by their project budgets. The remaining balance of the 2024 Outreach budget will be reviewed to see if we wish to provide additional support to current ministries and other needs in the community.

SPOTLIGHT ON REFUGEE STRESS AND TRAUMA

This article, by Brenda Hammersley, is based on an interview with Melissa Miller, RN.

Community Refugee & Immigration Services (CRIS)

Imagine being in a new country with a few bus tokens and a little money in your pocket. Today you must get to 3 appointments as part of your move to this place. Street signs are not in English, and you must take your children with you because you don't know anyone to help care for them. At each appointment, you're received by someone speaking quickly in a language you don't understand. At one appointment, your meeting is denied because children are not allowed. As the day goes by you run out of money and have no more bus tokens. The children are tired and hungry – what do you do?

This scenario is an all-too-common experience for new arrivals to the United States. To build resilience and support, new arrivals receive help from the CRIS Health and Wellness programs developed and implemented by Melissa Miller, RN. During a recent conversation, Melissa shared valuable information for us about the transition and challenges refugees face.

Individuals and families flee their homeland for reasons unique to each country. South Americans are escaping gangs that threaten their family; conflict and war drive out folks from the DRC and Ukraine; and in some countries, being a member of the LGBTQ community can result in imprisonment or execution. Melissa shared the story of an East African man who was highly educated and working for the government. When he was discovered to be a gay man he ran for his life from one country to another until he found a safe house where he spent two years in hiding. Today he has a fulltime job at Ohio Health, has bought a car, made friends at work, is saving money and looking forward to becoming a US citizen when he qualifies with 5 years of residency.

The literature documents 4 types of stress for refugees: trauma, acculturation, resettlement and isolation. In Melissa's experience, there are three stages of trauma that new-comers must confront: what happened to make them flee their homeland; the trauma of going to a new country for vetting before coming to the US; and the trauma of resettlement in the US. New arrivals are hopeful and think once

they're here everything will be okay, but they're isolated and don't know the language, culture, customs or means of transportation in their new home. They are dependent on strangers and not able to do the work they're trained/educated to do. For women and older adults, the impact of resettlement is increased due to the need to still be at home with children, having to learn a language at an older age, or being physically unable to do the work that is available. New arrivals experience a kind of reality shock and a sense of loss for their home and identity. This is particularly true for those who had advanced education because their degrees and professional status are devalued and not recognized – physicians and dentists work in warehouses to provide for their families.


In her work, Melissa sees clients with depression, anxiety and PTSD - much of which is unaddressed because of stigma, culture, and lack of resources. The Western model for mental health care leans heavily on individual therapy. Melissa knows her clients come from community-based societies and uses groups where she can help clients process stress in a culturally familiar way. She organizes and runs groups of refugees by language for nature walks, knitting, sewing groups, small group learning, dance, ceramics and art. While these appear to be simple hobbies, Melissa ensures each group is functioning to reduce isolation, improve language skills, address mental health needs, educate about US culture, teach how to navigate US systems, build a sense of community, improve physical health and promote resilience. She also explores past coping strategies and encourages folks to do something with their hands to move the energy of anxiety from their minds into an activity. The ultimate result is adults with the ability to reach economic stability while regaining a sense of security and hopefulness.

When asked what Saint Mark's parishioners should know about refugee support needs, Melissa responded: "They need jobs, transportation and language skill practice. But most of all, to be seen as human."

RESOURCES ON THE IMMIGRANT EXPERIENCE

CRIS staff stress the importance of being sensitive to the refugee experience and offer some resources and tools for you. They ask that we all look past the nationalities and labels of new arrivals and see in their eyes the human being who is trying to create a life as a stranger in a new land. And when political hype enflames others about immigration, the Rev. Dr. Michelle Boomgaard, Christ Episcopal Church in Springfield Ohio, suggests we refrain from sharing our supportive memes and posts because they keep the negative conversation going. In other words, "Drop the rope".


